EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Phase 1 public engagement for the proposed True North Campus, the redevelopment of Portage Place, has been completed and included:

- Establishment of a working group
- Stakeholder meetings with key organizations and entities
- A pop-up public engagement with in-person survey collection
- An online survey
- Focus group meetings for social planning organizations

The working group was developed to be a network of communication for local community interest groups and stakeholders, to ensure voices from all age groups and backgrounds are heard, to provide an opportunity for shared learning, regardless of perspective, to provide a critical first look and initial comments on draft material and concepts. The initial meeting was May 1, 2023, and provided direction on the proposed stakeholders to consult, and gave direction on five conversations that helped to structure the public consultation. These are:

- Inclusive and Welcoming
- Healthy Downtown
- Important Amenities
- Safety and Wellbeing
- Economic Development

A ranking exercise was also done to gain perspective on what the group saw as the key uses for the development in the categories of Housing and Food, Neighbourhood Services and Public Spaces. This provided the list of amenities for the survey questions to the public.

The seven stakeholder meetings followed the same format as the working group meeting and helped to inform the presentation to the community and the questions for the public survey.

The pop-up event on May 30 was very well attended and we received 264 completed surveys. There were also extensive conversations with the participants that provided insight into how they use the space now and what they would like improved.

The initial online survey provided a further 210 responses. This was followed up with focus group meetings and an extension of the survey for targeted groups such as Investors Group, youth groups with Art City, and the social planning organizations that brought another 228 responses.

The total number of survey responses was 702. The information in the survey allowed for analysis of the data for those that identified as living in the area. This broke out 202 of the survey responses for both in-person and online. The overall results of the survey and this subset are very similar and have provided key components to be considered in the overall design of the campus. This illustrates the top three ranked elements for each question.

The collective comments obtained from the surveys reflect the desire of the community to have the development be responsive to the needs of the neighbourhood for affordable living that is safe and accessible. The surveys, coupled with the discussions during in-person engagements and meetings, also highlight the community’s inclination for a development that embraces an open and inviting atmosphere, catering to the needs of all members of the Winnipeg community, regardless of demographic background.

ADDITIONAL IDEAS FROM THE COMMUNITY:

- Make the design for the neighbourhood, inclusive and affordable, so that those who use the space now are not forced out.
- Have partnerships with other health agencies in the area to avoid duplication of services and to gain advice on opportunities and issues in the neighbourhood.
- Have a community group, like the working group, to advise on the uses and spaces for the community area. This will assist in making the spaces successful for the neighbourhood.
- Partner with housing organizations for any affordable housing to gain insight into the issues and needs of the community.
- Have an Indigenous member of the design team.
- Community-based safety rather than security guards.
- The focus for the community is affordability. This is in housing, retail, food, and services. They are concerned that this will be another development for the elite and is not for the entire demographic of the neighbourhood.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

This comprehensive report outlines the Public Engagement Team’s engagement process, reflecting their commitment to gathering vital insights from the community, stakeholders, and targeted groups.

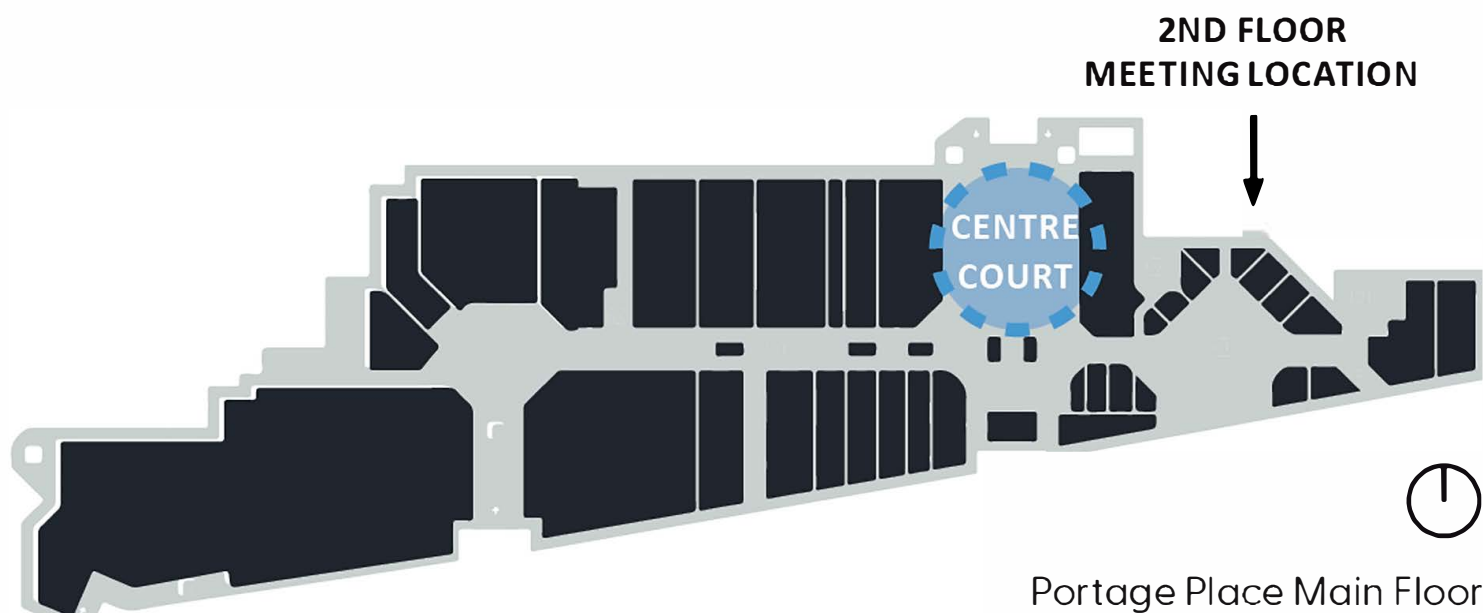
Emphasizing inclusivity and collaboration, our engagement strategy encompassed diverse approaches, including a working group, stakeholder meetings, a well-attended pop-up public event, an extensive online survey, and focused discussions with key organizations. Valuable input from these groups generally helped substantiate the proposed preliminary conceptual vision. This input will also help inform the evolution of the design moving forward.

The working group, as a proficient communication network, promoted constructive dialogue and provided valuable input on draft materials and conceptual ideas. Its guidance helped direct the consultation process, centring on discussions revolving around inclusivity, a thriving downtown, essential amenities, safety and well-being, and sustainable economic growth.

The data derived from the pop-up event and online survey proved to be significant, revealing crucial insights into demographics, visitation trends, and community priorities concerning housing, neighbourhood services, arts and culture, green spaces, and more.

This report highlights the various results from the survey, comments from the working and/or stakeholder group and community-suggested ideas, including building strategic partnerships with health agencies, incorporating indigenous perspectives, and implementing community-based safety measures.

We extend our sincere appreciation to all participants who generously provided their time and insights to Phase 1 of the public engagement process. Their contributions, spanning the working group, stakeholder meetings, the pop-up public event, online survey, have been important in shaping the outcomes reflected in this report. Their commitment to this effort has helped enriched the understanding of Downtown Winnipeg and Portage Place, and set a strong foundation for future decision-making.

1.1 Public Engagement Process

The Public Engagement Team took an inclusive and diligent approach by involving key downtown organizations and stakeholders in stakeholder meetings and establishing a working group in early May. The team chose a vacant retail space in Portage Place Mall as their primary basecamp and meeting location, ensuring continuity and accessibility for all participants.

Emphasizing collaboration, the team provided a planned engagement strategy, clear expectations, and a timeline to the stakeholders and working group. Valuable input from these groups helped shape the preliminary concept vision in addition to assisting with outreach materials, ensuring effectiveness and accessibility for all.

Survey responses were gathered through digital means and in-person interactions during the open house pop-up event at Portage Place on Tuesday, May 30, 2023. The online survey, launched on May 22, 2023, received a substantial response rate. Posters, in both physical and digital formats, were widely distributed, containing accessible information about the concept vision, engagement timelines, the open house pop-up event, and easy-to-access links to the public survey.

The in-person open house event held in Edmonton Court of Portage Place Mall received enthusiastic feedback from the community, leading to a significant number of survey responses. During the pop-up event, Persons Community Solution (PCS) hosts played a crucial role in enhancing communication, engagement friendliness, and outreach. The visual survey posters utilized at the pop-up event featured graphics and accessible language, ensuring a user-friendly experience for all participants. Breakfast, lunch, dinner, snacks and beverages were provided at this in person open house event.

To gather targeted input, the team reopened the online survey from July 4 to July 21, 2023, actively seeking responses from neighbouring businesses, youth, and equity-serving organizations. The team also held in-person meetings with these specific stakeholder groups throughout Downtown, encouraging direct communication and providing a platform for sharing insights and feedback. Food and beverages were provided during these focus group meetings.

The following analysis encompasses all survey results received between May 30th and July 21st, incorporating the initial online surveys, in-person surveys conducted during the Portage Place pop-up event, and subsequent targeted surveys.

1.2 Participation

STAKEHOLDERS

Up to 60 stakeholders were initially contacted to participate in stakeholder meetings and subsequent working group meetings. However, not all contacted stakeholders chose to participate in these meetings. Additionally, numerous other organizations were engaged during the Phase 1 engagement process. The general stakeholder groups involved in the engagement process encompassed neighbourhood organizations; arts, culture, and program-specific groups; community organizations; education; economic development; and neighbouring businesses. For a comprehensive list of engaged stakeholders and additional contributors, please refer to Appendix H.

In addition, True North Real Estate Development is directly engaging with Health and Wrap Around Services to provide direction on the proposed Health component of the True North Campus. Omitted from the stakeholder outreach were all four levels of government: Federal, Provincial, Civic, and Indigenous governments (including the Southern Chiefs' Organization). True North Real Estate Development is directly engaging with the governments to provide direction on the True North Campus, coordinate services and amenities with Wehwehneh Bahgahkinagohn (HBC) development, and coordinate other impacted public amenities.

POP-UP EVENT

The pop-up event held throughout the day on May 30th saw a substantial turnout, resulting in 264 completed surveys. The event provided an opportunity for extensive conversations with participants, gaining valuable insights into their current space usage and improvement suggestions.

ONLINE SURVEY

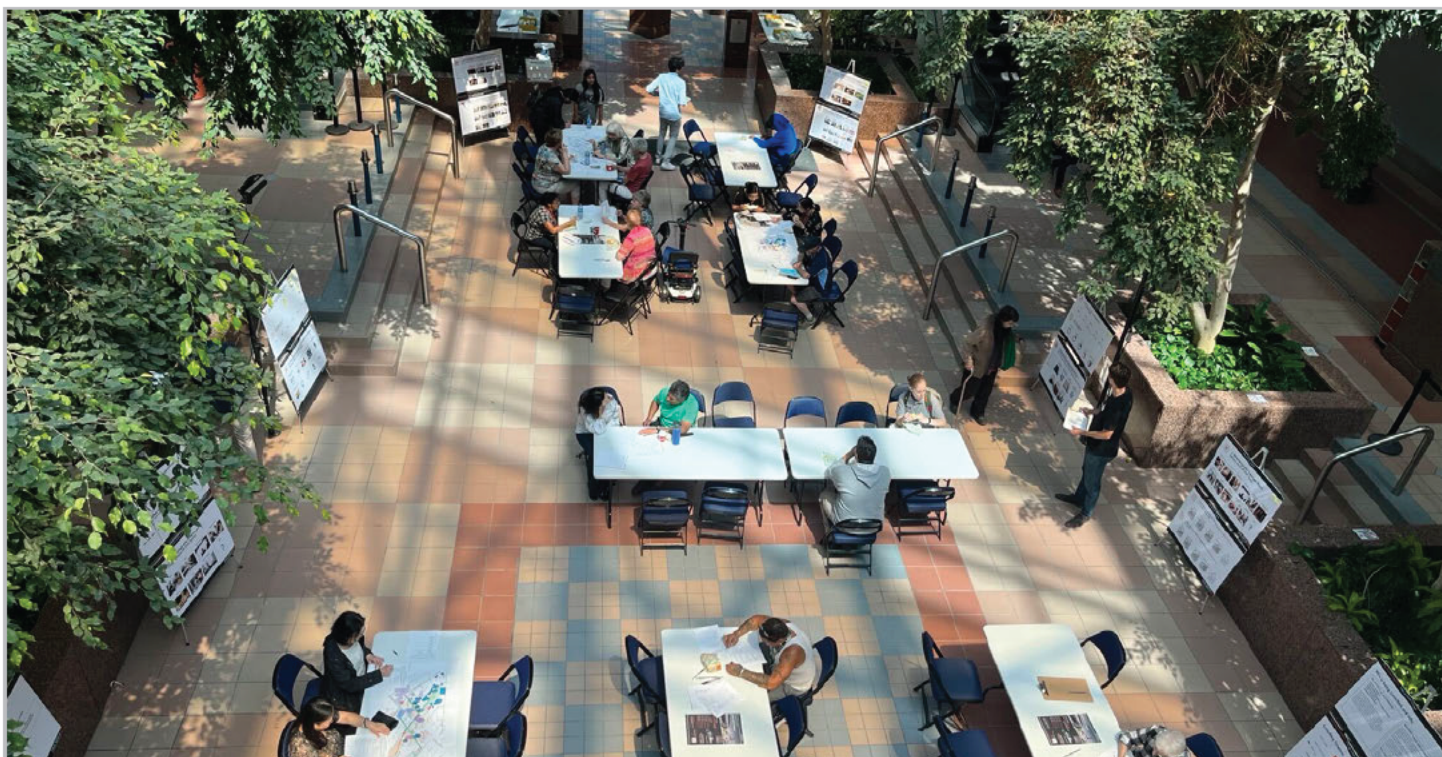
The initial online survey received 210 responses. Following this, focus group meetings were conducted, and the survey was extended to specific groups such as the Investors Group, youth groups with Art City, and social planning organizations, bringing in 228 more responses.

TOTAL SURVEYS

A total of 702 survey responses were obtained. The following report consolidates all survey results received from May 30th to July 21, encompassing online surveys from May 30th to June 9th, in-person surveys conducted during the Portage Place pop-up event, and subsequent surveys completed between July 4 and July 21, 2023.

2.1 Demographics

AGE

One-third of respondents identified as mid-age adults (age 40–59; 32%), followed by older adults (60–79; 26%), and young adults (age 25–39; 25%). Following targeted outreach to youth organizations, there were a total of 61 individuals or 9% of respondents that identified as youth (24 years of age or under).


SELF-IDENTIFICATION

Out of the total 702 survey responses, 358 respondents identified themselves as female, accounting for approximately 51% of the total responses. In terms of representation among vulnerable communities, 20% of responses were from indigenous individuals, 10% from people of colour, 10% from LGBTQ2S community members, and approximately 13% from individuals with disabilities.










HOUSEHOLD INCOME

In-person responses saw a higher rate of lower-income households (\$0 – \$15,000; 25% and \$15,001 – \$32,500; 19%). In contrast, online responses saw a higher rate of households earning \$100k or more (\$100,000 +; 32%). One in ten people did not disclose their household income.

TRUE NORTH CAMPUS - POP-UP EVENT SURVEY



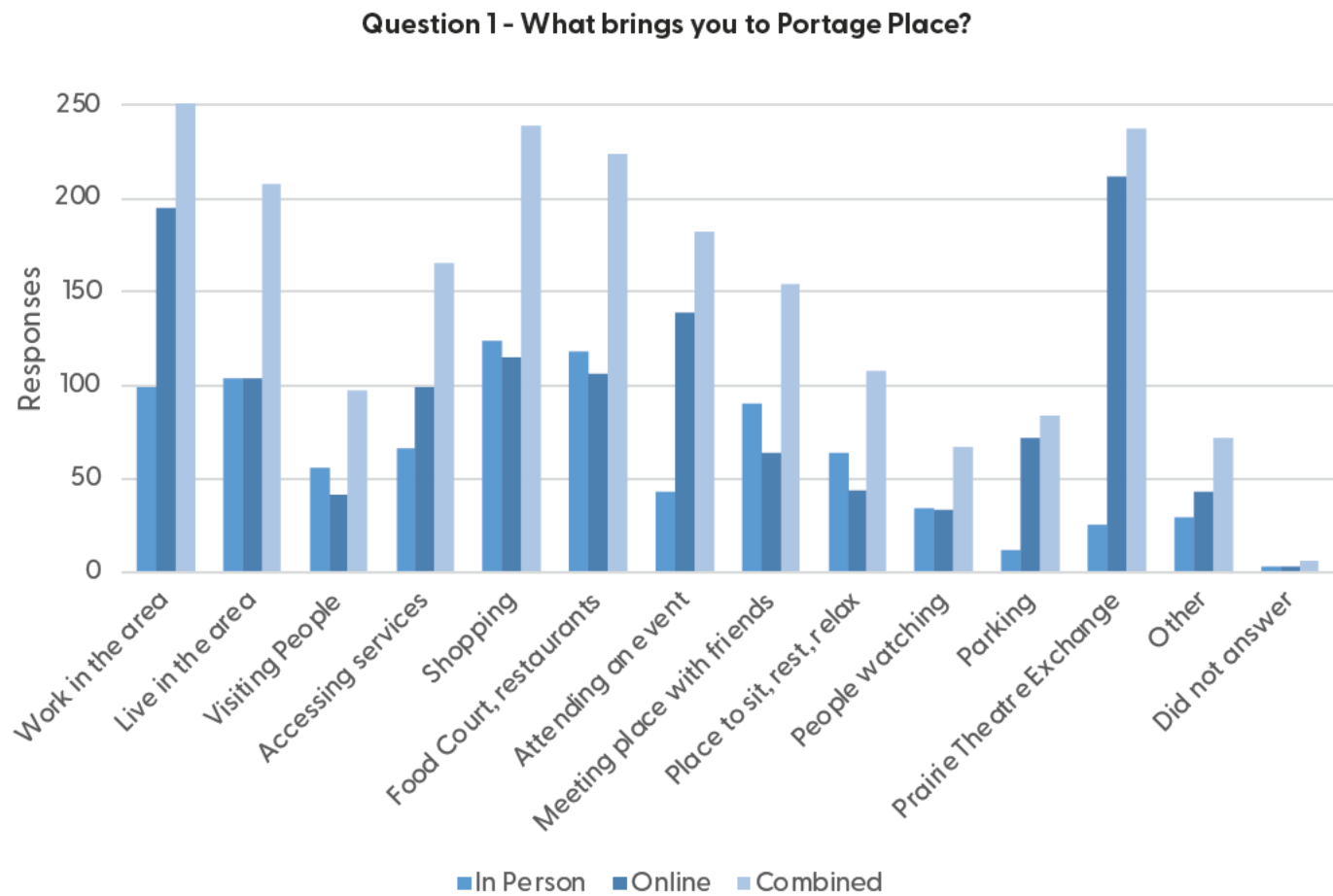

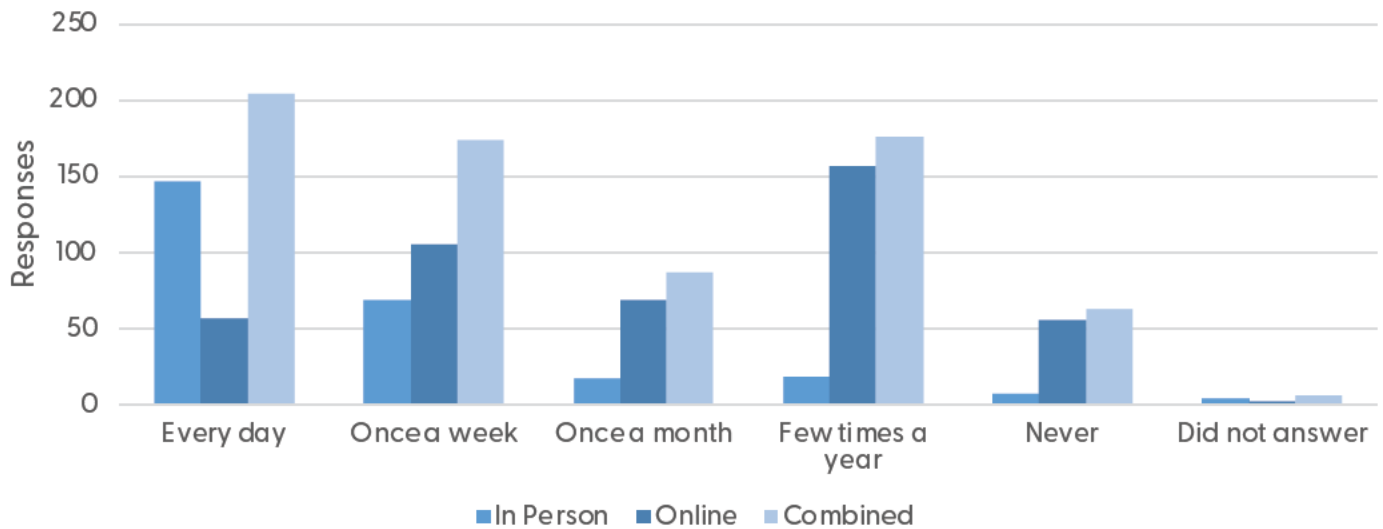
2.2 Visitation Trends

When asked about what brings you to Portage Place and Downtown, common themes that emerged were work in the area, entertainment such as the Prairie Theatre Exchange, and accessing services such as dining and shopping.



Not surprisingly, most of the in-person responses indicated that they visit Portage Place either daily or once a week. On the other hand, for the online results, people tend to visit Portage Place a few times a year if at all. The most popular time of day to visit Portage Place seems to be around lunch and in the afternoon for about 1-2 hours.

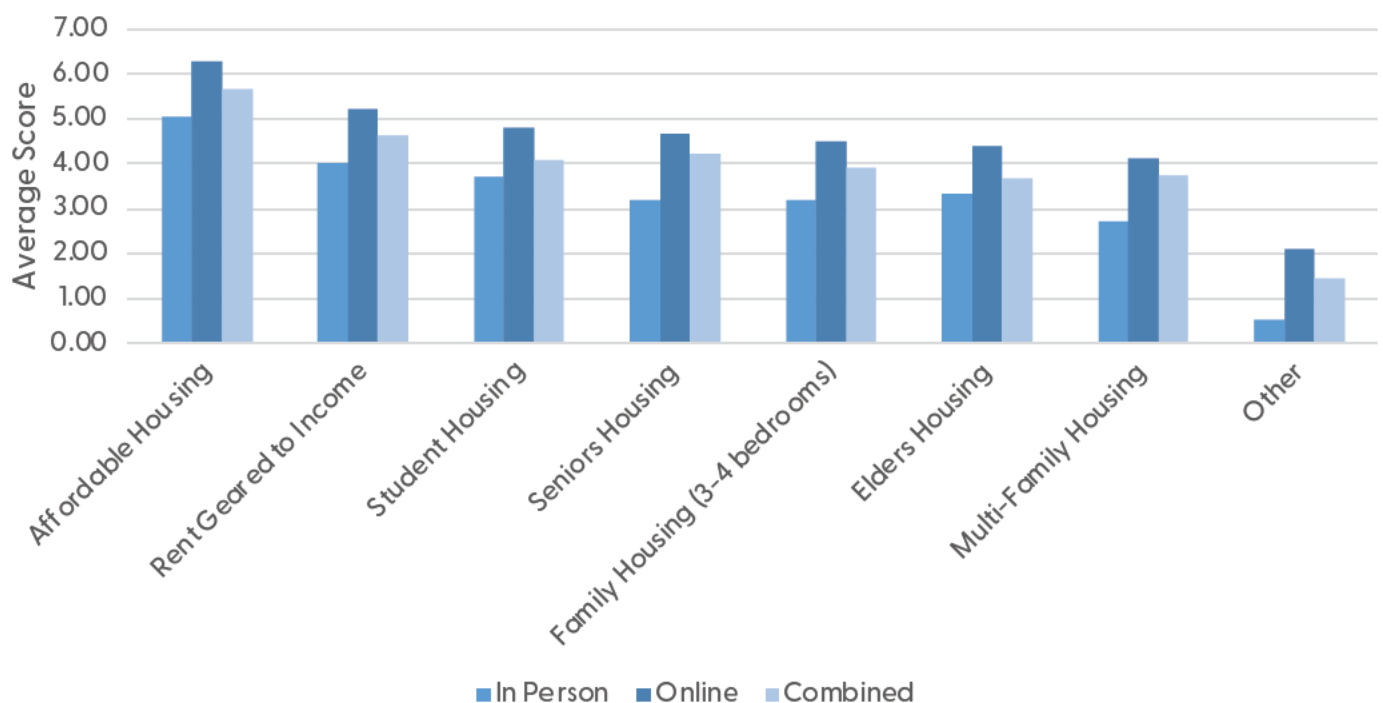
Question 2 - How often do you come to Portage Place in warm weather seasons?



2.3 Housing

Consistent across all results, affordable housing was the clear number one housing priority followed by rent geared to income, and seniors housing. Student and elder housing were both significantly higher in priority for people who attended the open house and completed the survey in person.

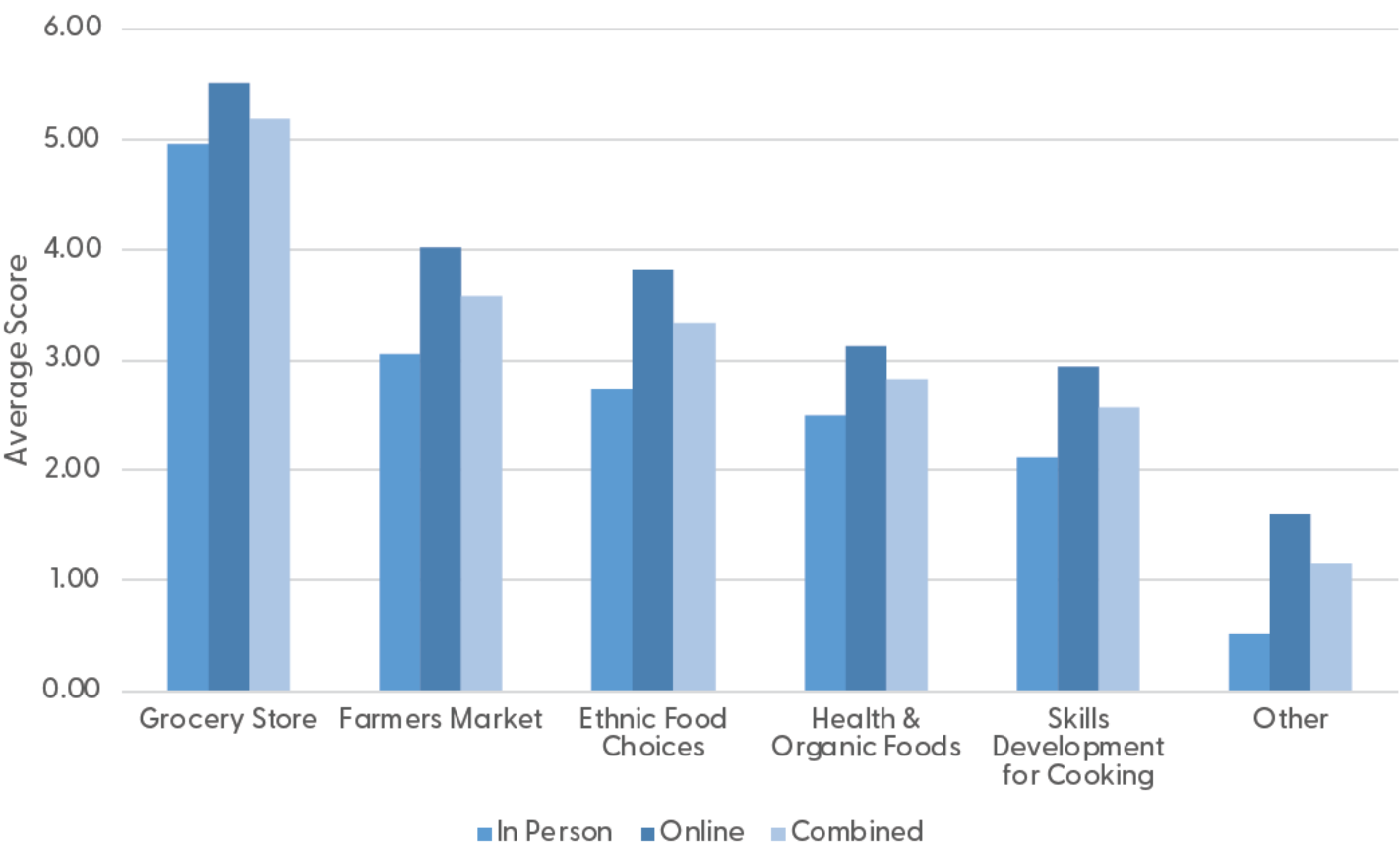
Question 6 - Community stakeholders have suggested that the following features be considered for the redesign of True North Campus for Housing.



2.4 Food Security

There is strong community consensus around the need for a grocery store. Ranked number one for both in-person and online responses, grocery store received a lot of attention in the additional comment section as well. Further emphasis was placed on affordable or chain grocery as opposed to upscale food products. It was noted by our Working Group that there is a downtown grocer at Donald and Broadway but our respondents did not feel this was in the neighbourhood and affordable.

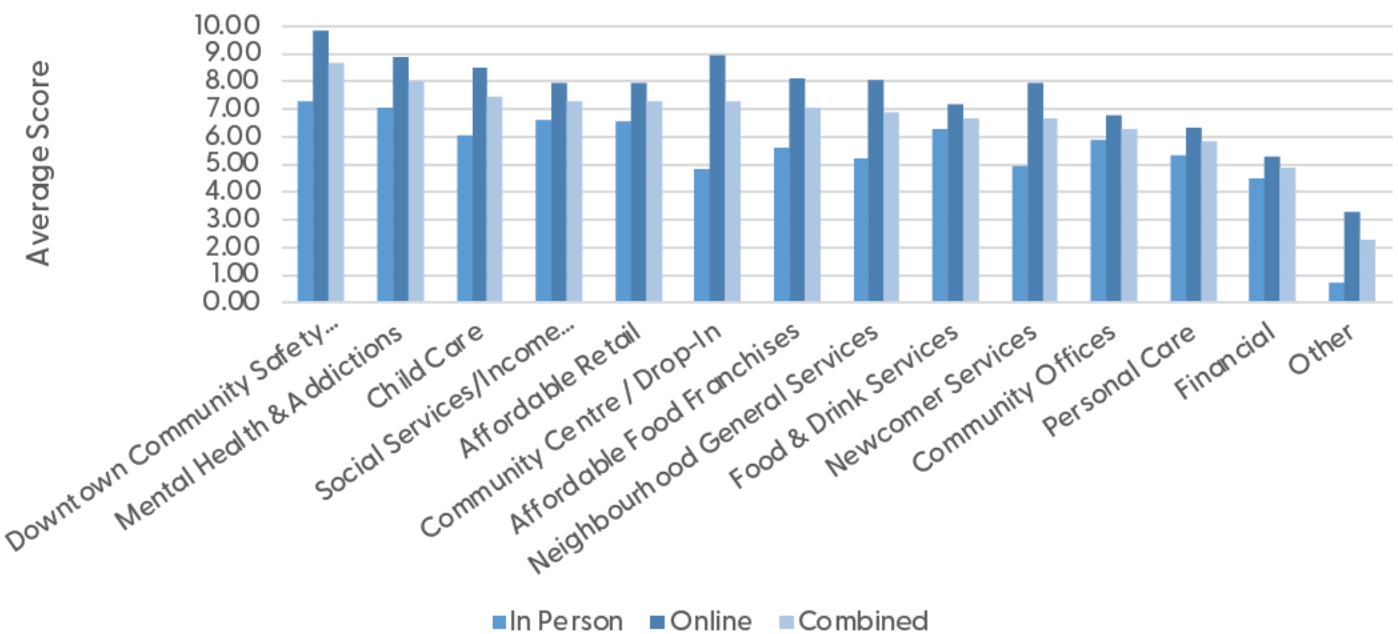

2.5 Neighbourhood Services

Overall, scores assigned for neighbourhood services were balanced with Downtown Community Safety, Mental Health and Addictions, and Child Care consistently ranking near the top. The largest difference in responses between in-person and online results came on the idea of including a Community Centre with Drop-in space available. This item ranked high on the list when engaging youth and equity serving organizations.

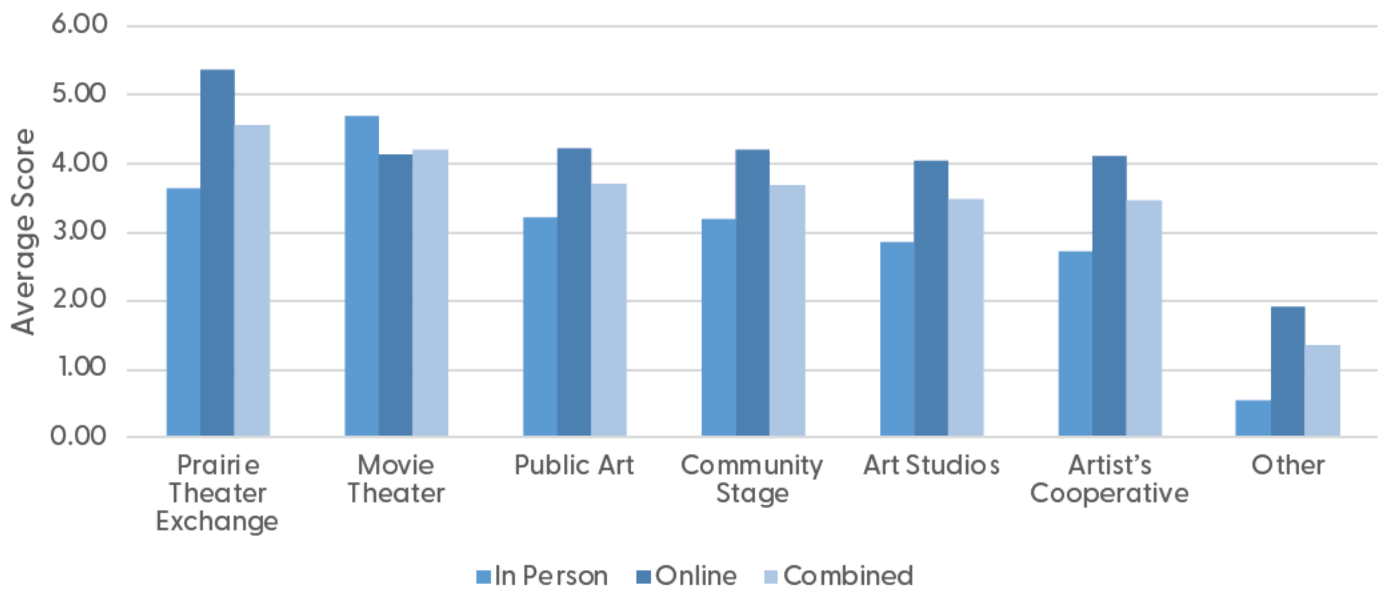

2.6 Arts and Culture

Performing arts and entertainment was a consistent theme across results. The Prairie Theatre Exchange, Movie Theatre, and community stage ranked high on the list for Arts and Culture amenities to be included. Other common ideas include dance studio and drop-in art programming. Artist’s studio and Artist cooperative ranked high for youth organizations.

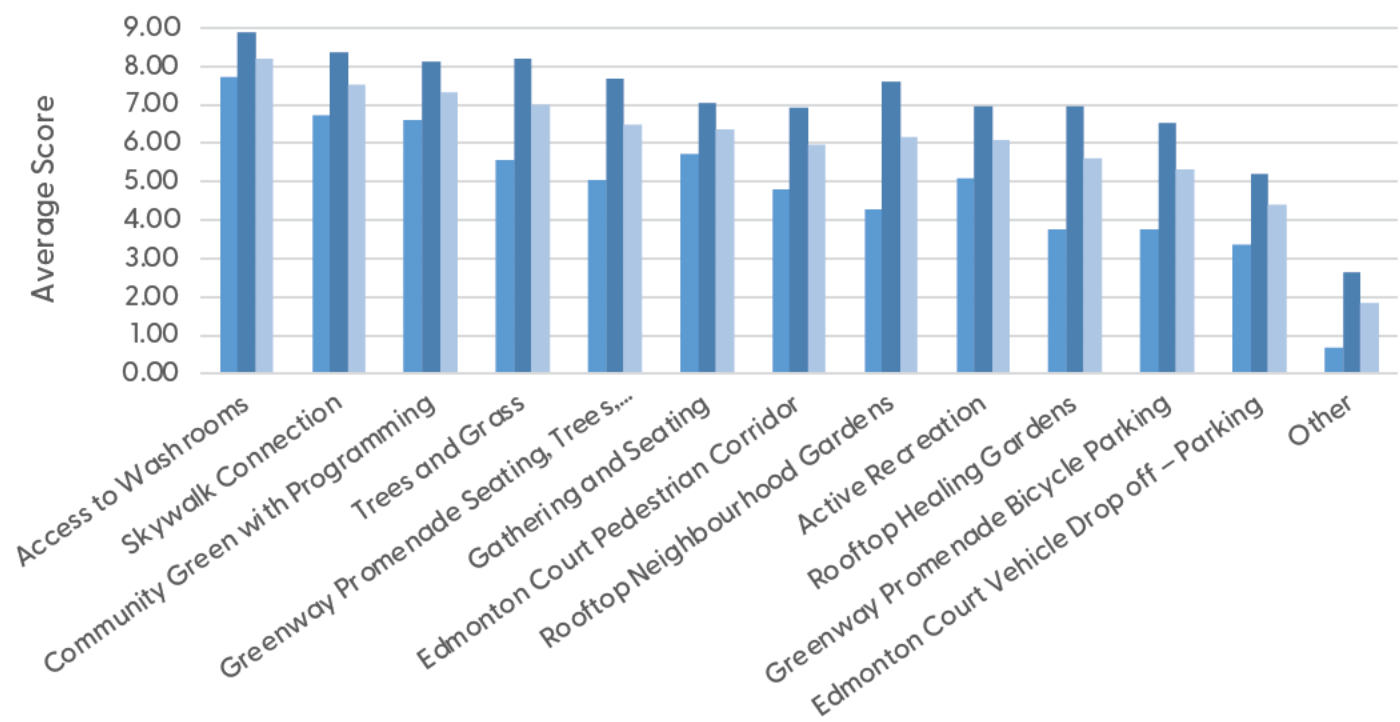

2.7 Public Spaces and Greenways

Consistent across results were priorities related to public washrooms, skywalk connections and community greenspace with programming. It is worth noting that ‘trees and grass’ and ‘active recreation’ were also a top priority among those that completed the survey in-person.

2.8 Other Priorities

Additional priorities surfaced within the general comments, highlighting the need for a True North Campus that offers a welcoming atmosphere, proudly open and inviting to every member of the Winnipeg community, catering to all demographic needs. Other important aspects involve enhancing community infrastructure, ensuring safety and security, collaborating with Indigenous leaders on co-designing efforts, and maintaining an enjoyable shopping and dining experience. 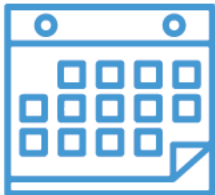
3.0 RESULTS – LIVE IN THE AREA

Of the 702 total surveys, 212 respondents identified themselves as living in the area. For the full results and graphs please consult Appendix E: Live in the Area.



3.1 Demographics

A third of the respondents were 60-79 years old, another third were 40-59 years old, and then the remaining third were the remaining age brackets. A quarter of respondents identified self as Indigenous, and over half of the surveys were filled out by a woman. The income levels varied to show a cross between the income brackets.



3.2 Visitation Trends

The primary motivations for their visits to Portage Place Mall are the following:

1. Shopping
2. The food court
3. Accessing services

The frequency of visits is notable, with a the majority visiting every day (96) or at a minimum of once a week (64). It's worth noting that even during colder weather conditions, a substantial number of individuals continue with their regular visits, with 95 maintaining daily routines and 67 visiting weekly.

The most popular time to visit the Mall is the afternoon (155) but about half of respondents visit in the morning (109) and lunchtime (103). In terms of duration, the majority of respondents spend under an hour (97) or between 1 to 2 hours (76) during their visits to the Mall.



3.3 Housing

In a redesign of the Campus, the top three housing types recommended by those living in the area include:

1. Affordable housing
2. Rent geared to income
3. Seniors housing

This assessment was conducted utilizing an average scoring system. In the context of housing, the respondents identified that it was important to consider different accessibility needs for individuals with disabilities, diverse demographic groups, and newcomers. Moreover, we should also factor in the various ownership and tenancy choices available, including renting, condominiums, and hotels.



3.4 Food Security

When addressing the matter of food security, the following top three options were recommended:

1. Grocery store
2. Farmers market
3. Health and organic foods

The affordability of food remains as a primary focus. It was recommended to establish either a designated food bank pick-up location or facilitate the development of a full-service grocery store for the entire community. Both options aim to alleviate the challenges associated with food accessibility and affordability.



3.5 Neighbourhood Services

In the context of neighborhood services, the three most prominent responses were:

1. Downtown Community Safety Program
2. Mental health and addiction services
3. Social services/Income Assistance

The written comments also brought attention to an area featuring amenities such as a piano, hairdressing services, and a movie theatre. Additionally, there was an identification of the absence of community foot patrols in the area.



3.6 Culture and Arts

Regarding Culture and Arts, the three most prominent responses were:

1. Movie theatre
2. Prairie Theatre Exchange
3. Public Art

The responses indicate a desire for accessible entertainment options. Moreover, the recognition of the existing creative and cultural amenities reflects a genuine appreciation for the artistic offerings already in place. Moreover, an appreciation for the existing creative and cultural amenities. Beyond this, the responses underscore the significance of aesthetics and creative expression as an important component.



3.7 Public Spaces and Greenways

A key element for Public Spaces and Greenways is the programming and management of the areas to guarantee their safety and optimal utilization. The top three responses for this category were:

1. Access to washrooms
2. Skywalk connection
3. Community green with programming

It should be noted that greenery, gathering spaces and seating, the Edmonton Pedestrian Corridor, and rooftop neighbourhood gardens all had significantly high average scores.

3.8 Survey Comments

The reoccurring themes are affordability, a place for all, safety, accessibility, and placemaking to gather and shop. In the comments section, there was multiple mentions of Indigenous security personnel, as well as traditional teachings and gatherings. There were also compliments of the True North Campus proposal, saying this is needed and time is of essence. Consistent mentions in the comments emphasize the demand for round-the-clock access to services such as the YMCA and well-lit walkways. One resident summarized the survey responses quite succinctly:

“It needs to be a community hub for the people who live downtown who are mainly seniors, university students, immigrants, indigenous people, homeless people and those suffering from mental issues. It needs to be a place that offers the supports and amenities that this population needs. It needs to have lots of green spaces and recreation areas where people of these diverse cultures can meet and get to know each other. If it has this neighbourhood environment people from the suburbs will have far less apprehensions and feel safer about visiting our neighbourhood”

4.0 RESULTS – TARGETED INTEREST GROUPS

The following summarizes the responses from the 228 targeted stakeholders, being neighbouring businesses, youth, and equity-serving organizations. For the full results and graphs please consult Appendix F: Targeted Interest Groups.

Of these stakeholders, the majority were women, followed by individuals identifying as members of the LGBTQ2S community and men.

4.1 Visitation Trends

The primary motivations for their visits to Portage Place Mall are the following:

1. Entertainment (77),
2. Meeting friends (77)
3. Work (61)

The targeted interest groups typically visit the area either on a weekly basis or a few times annually, primarily for shopping, accessing services, and attending the Prairie Theatre Exchange. Their visits predominantly occur during the afternoon (78), evening (72), and lunchtime (42) hours. On average, their stays last for 1-2 hours (50), with a notable proportion spending just under an hour (37) or 2-3 hours (36).

4.2 Housing

The top two housing types recommended by the respondents include:

1. Affordable housing is number one
2. Rent geared to income
3. Family housing

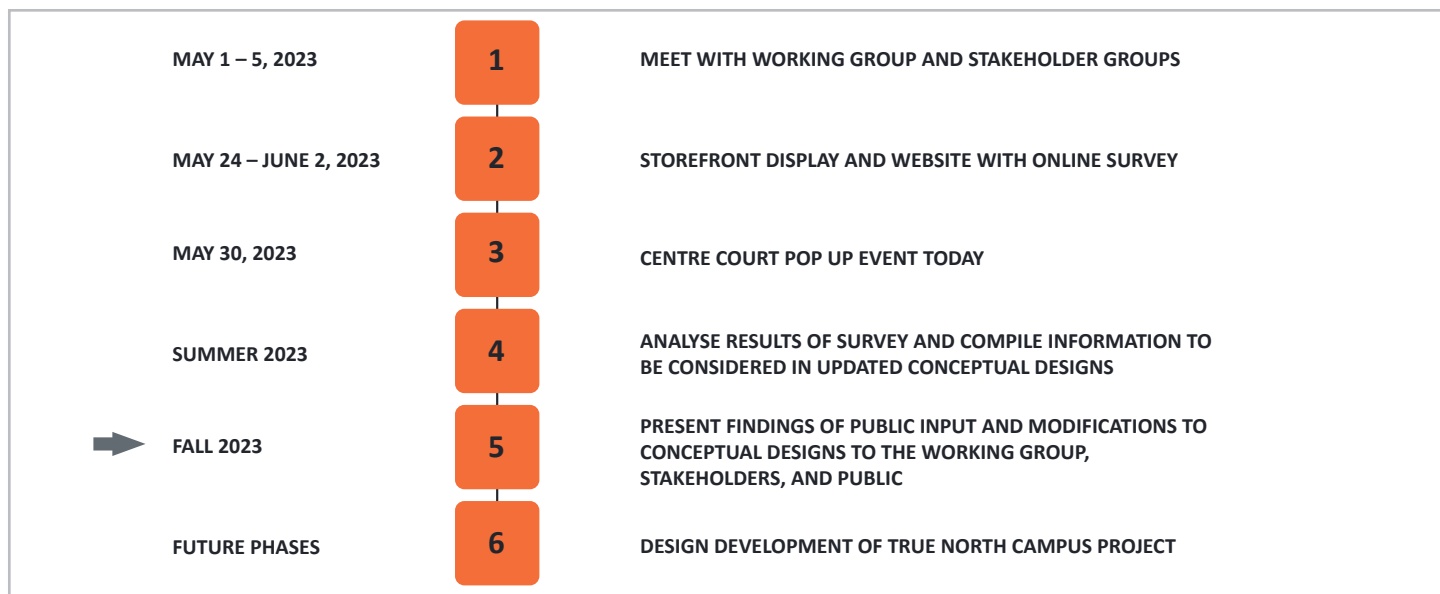
It's important to highlight that the respondents recognized a necessity for all types of housing.

4.3 Food Security

Within the context of food security, the most prominent responses center around the importance of having:

1. Grocery store
2. Farmers market
3. Ethnic food choices

It's noteworthy that comments from respondents consistently underscore a notable focus on the dual aspects of affordability and access to healthy food options as key priorities within the domain of food security.

4.4 Community Services

Concerning community services, the predominant preferences are as follows:

1. Community centre/drop-in
2. Mental health & addictions
3. Downtown community safety program

Again, most service options garnered relatively high rankings across the board, with the exception of financial services. Noteworthy recurring themes, particularly emphasized by youth and equity-focused responses, involve Studio 393 and the significance of a skate park.

4.5 Culture and Arts

Regarding Culture and Arts, the three most prominent responses were:

1. Prairie Theatre Exchange
2. Art studios
3. Artist's cooperative

The respondents' feedback underscores an appreciation for the current creative offerings, a recognition of the value of creative spaces, and a prevalent inclination within the community toward collaborative artistic efforts.

4.6 Public Spaces and Greenways

In the realm of public spaces and greenways, the three most significant responses are:

4. Washroom access
5. Community greenspaces with programming
6. Rooftop neighbourhood gardens

The remaining choices all ranked higher than 5 except Edmonton Court pedestrian drop off. In the comments a bike valet, and a place people can walk and enjoy nature, an escape from the urban environment. Additionally, the comments emphasize the significance of creating a safe, inclusive, and collaborative space that connects with existing downtown organizations like Studio 393, Genesis Arts Community, and Graffiti Arts Programming.

5.0 ENGAGEMENT INSIGHTS

This report marks the completion of Phase 1 in the planning process, signifying an important step forward. Sharing insights into what comes next will be crucial, the information gathered within this report is intended to be reviewed by stakeholders and will be made public in Phase 2. As the process moves ahead, the project team will use this feedback to help shape the design of the proposed True North Campus, and our team plans to continue our discussions with the different community groups and members. Hearing from the community will remain vital to making this project successful.

The methods used in Phase 1 of the engagement process ensured a comprehensive range of perspectives. The working group emerged as an invaluable communication channel, generating constructive dialogues and providing input on draft materials and conceptual ideas. Their guidance helped direct the public engagement process, also highlighting the importance of inclusivity, a desire for a thriving and accessible downtown, vital amenities, safety, well-being, and sustainable growth.

Survey data collected from the online submissions, the in-person pop-up event, and targeted interest group engagement provided crucial insights into demographics, visitation patterns, and community priorities spanning housing, neighbourhood services, arts and culture, green spaces, and more.

This report consolidates survey results, offering a snapshot of the community's collective sentiment.

Information obtained from the surveys reflects the desire of the community to have the development be responsive to the needs of the neighbourhood for affordable living that is safe and accessible. The surveys, coupled with the discussions during in-person engagements and meetings, also highlight the community's inclination for a development that embraces an open and inviting atmosphere, catering to the needs of all members of the Winnipeg community, regardless of demographic background.

ADDITIONAL SUGGESTIONS FROM THE COMMUNITY INCLUDE:

- Making the design for the neighbourhood, inclusive and affordable, so that those who use the space now are not forced out.
- Forge partnerships with other health agencies in the area to avoid duplication of services and to gain advice on opportunities and issues in the neighbourhood.
- Establish a community advisory group, akin to the working group, for community area planning and programming, ensuring local success.
- Collaborate with housing organizations to inform affordable housing strategies, to gain insight into the issues and needs of the community.
- Integrate an Indigenous member within the design team.
- Opt for community-based safety measures over security personnel.
- Community affordability is of utmost importance in areas such as housing, retail, food, and services. This ensures an approach that includes people from all demographics and prevents the development from becoming exclusive and limited to a certain group.

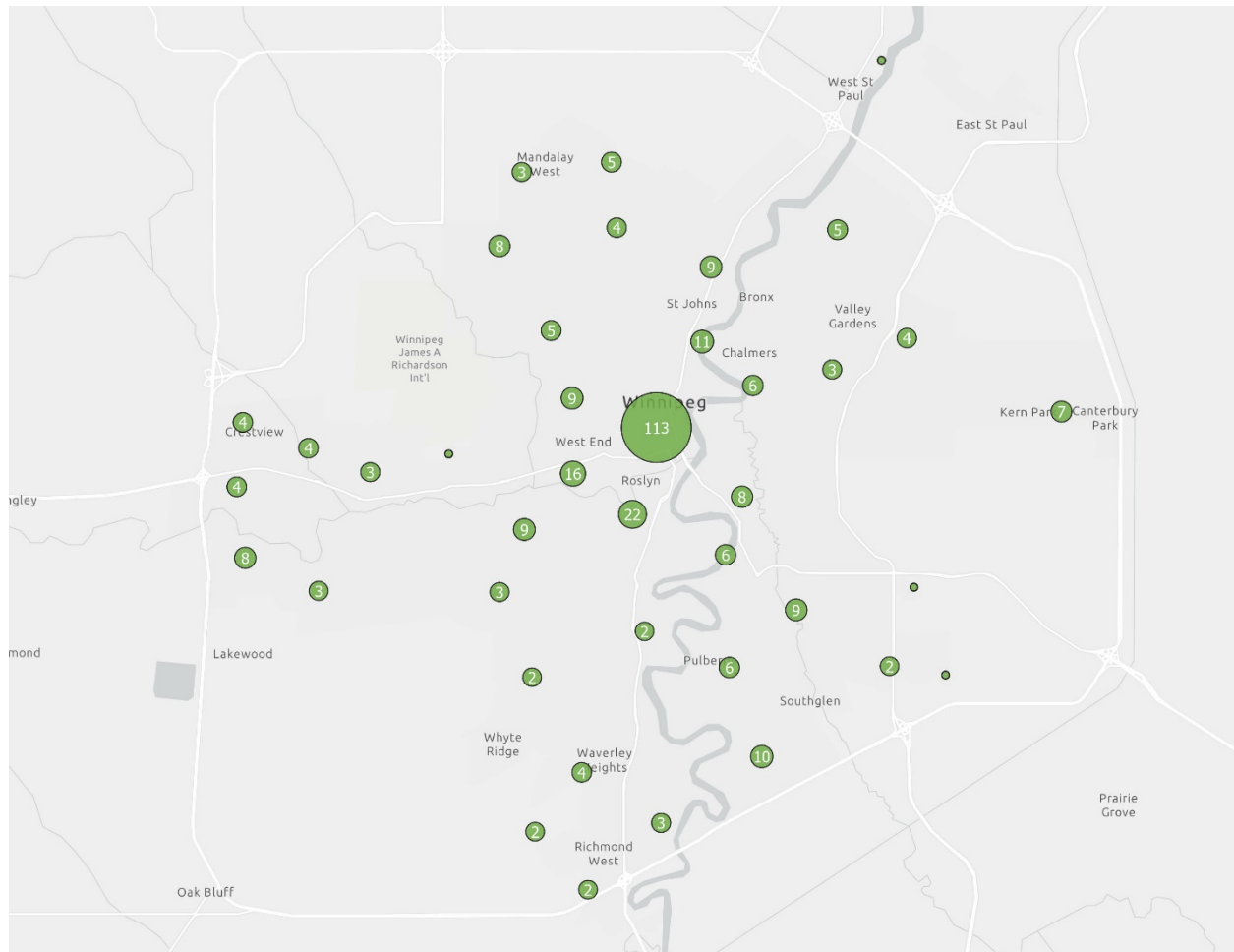

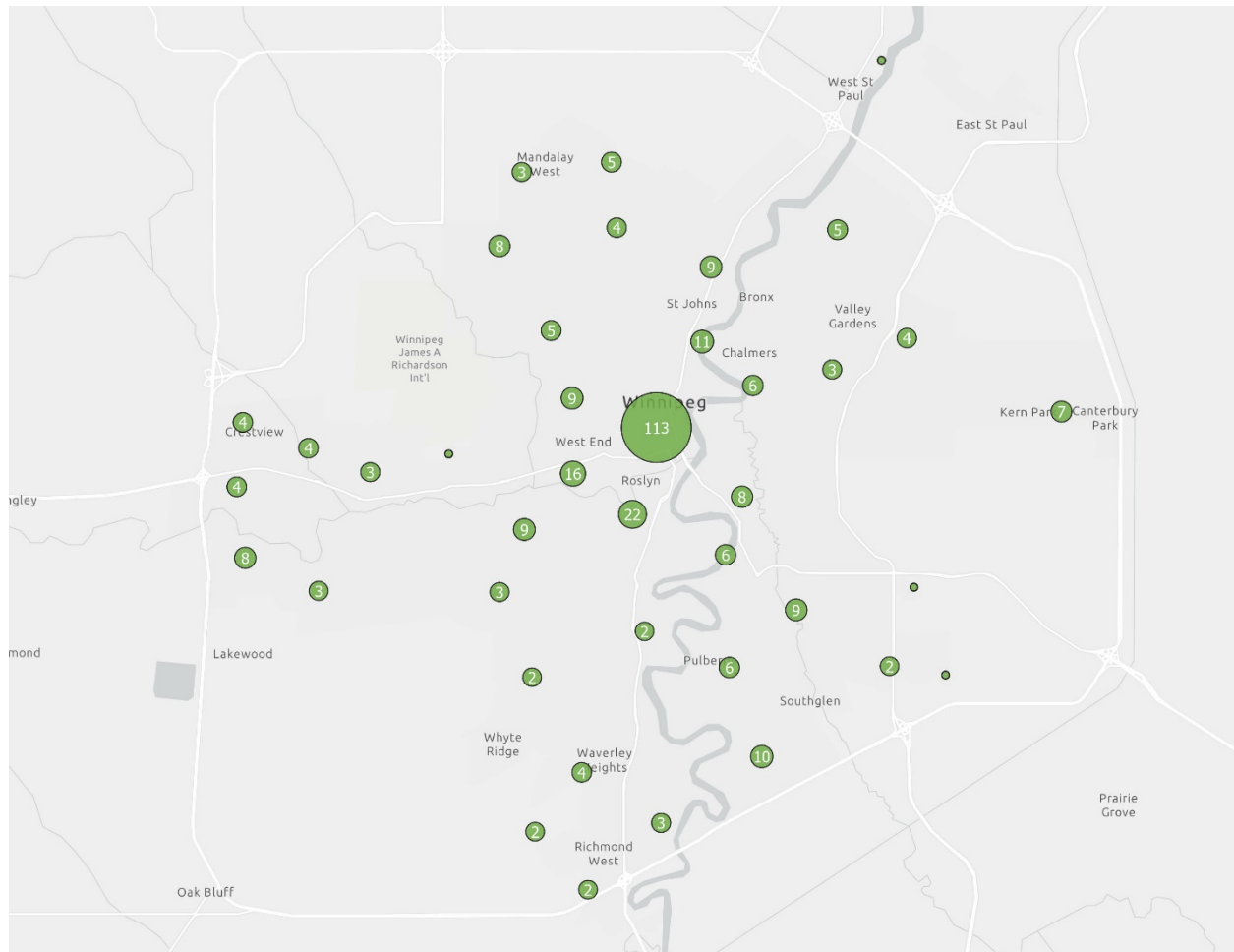

The following is a summary of survey responses for the True North Campus project is filtered by those who identified living in the Downtown Winnipeg area. The survey was designed to reach Portage Place users in order to compile the following information:

- Purpose of using Portage Place
- Time of year and time of day visitation
- Priorities for housing
- Priorities for food security
- Priorities for neighbourhood services
- Priorities for arts and culture
- Priorities for greenspace
- General comments
- Demographic questions (age, self-identification, household income)
- Purpose of visiting Downtown
- Location of residence (postal code)

Survey responses were collected digitally and in-person at the Open House event at Portage Place on Tuesday May 30, 2023. The online survey launched May 22, 2023 and closed June 9, 2023. It was re-opened on July 6, 2023 until July 21, 2023 for additional targeted responses from youth and equity-serving organizations. During this time, the online survey received 107 responses from individuals who live in the immediate area. The Open House event generated another 105 responses for a combined total of 212 surveys completed by those that live in the Portage Place area.

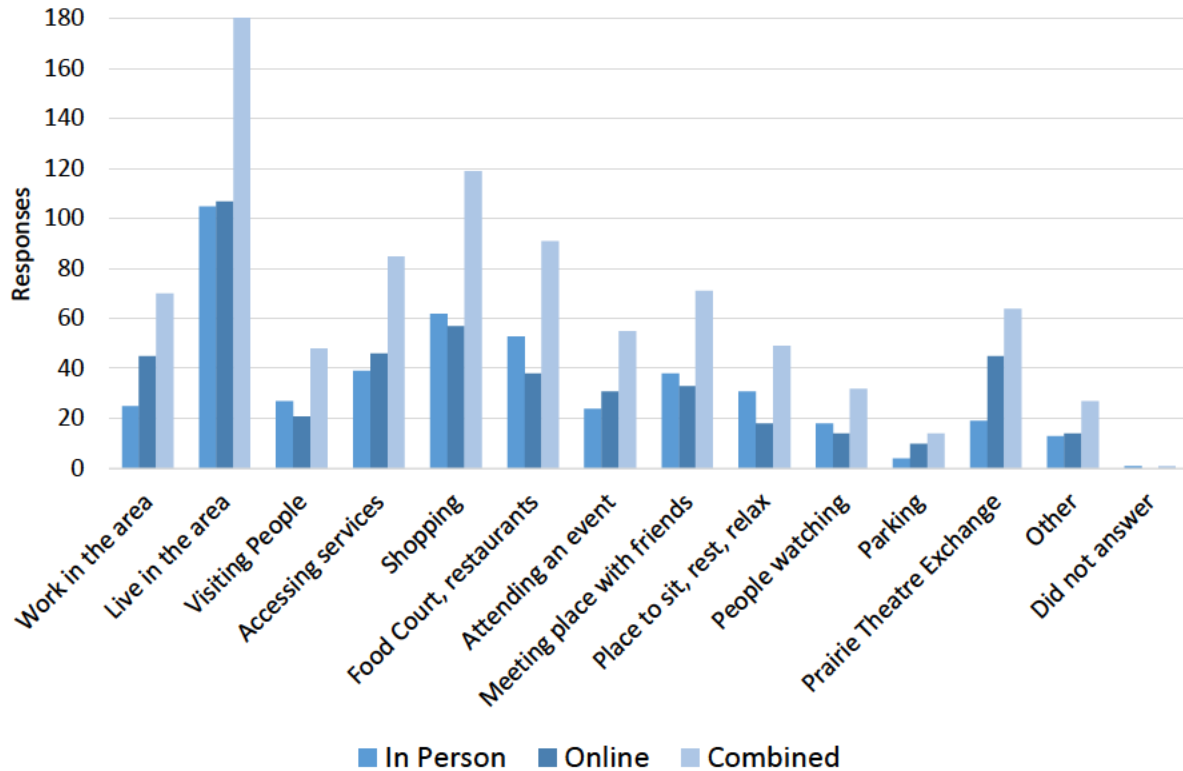
Survey results presented herein use clustered column charts with categories comparing online, hard copy and combined responses.

Ranking questions that are intended to measure priorities for housing, food security, neighbourhood services, arts and culture, and greenspace (i.e. questions 6-10) are evaluated based on the average score that was given to each option. Scores are determined based on the number of options provided in the question.

For example, if there are 5 choices in the question, the choice at the top gets a score of 5, the choice after that a 4, etc. If you have a list with 7 choices, the one at the top gets a score of 7, and so forth.

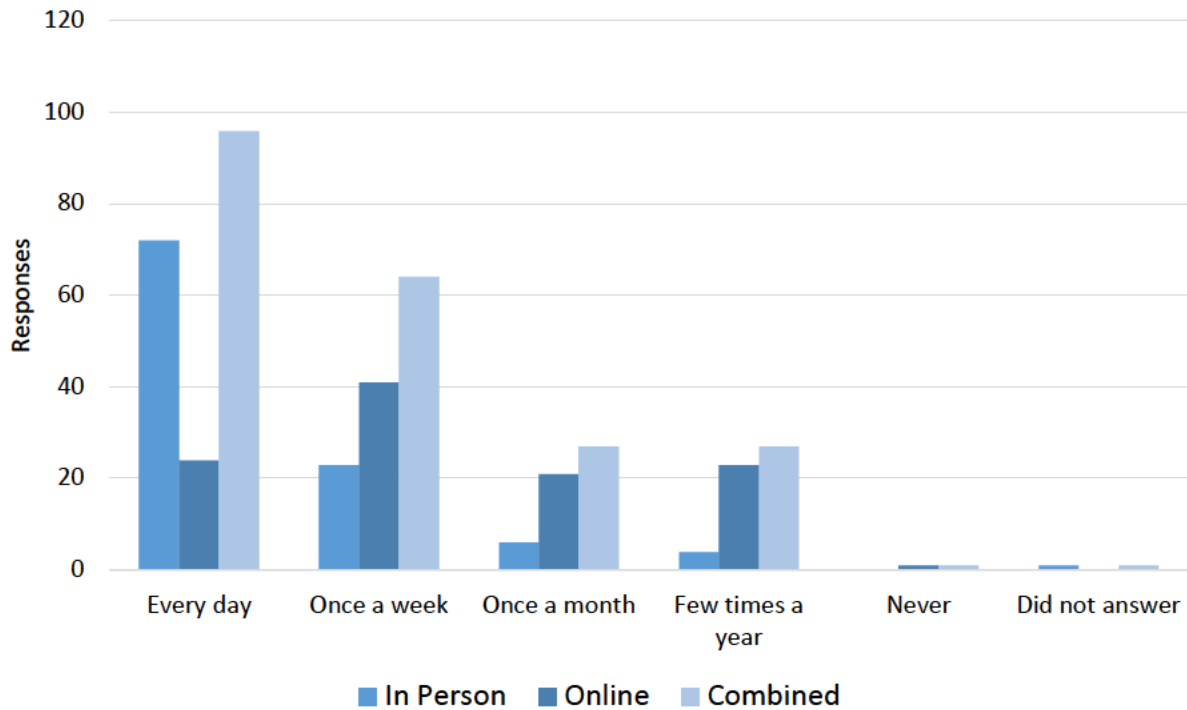
Please note that because there were a number of people who skipped the ranking questions for the in person survey, in addition to those who ranked only a few items (as opposed to the online survey that required each choice to be ranked), the average score of the in person survey is significantly lower than the online score due to skipped and incomplete answers are given a default score of 0, therefore lowering the average score.

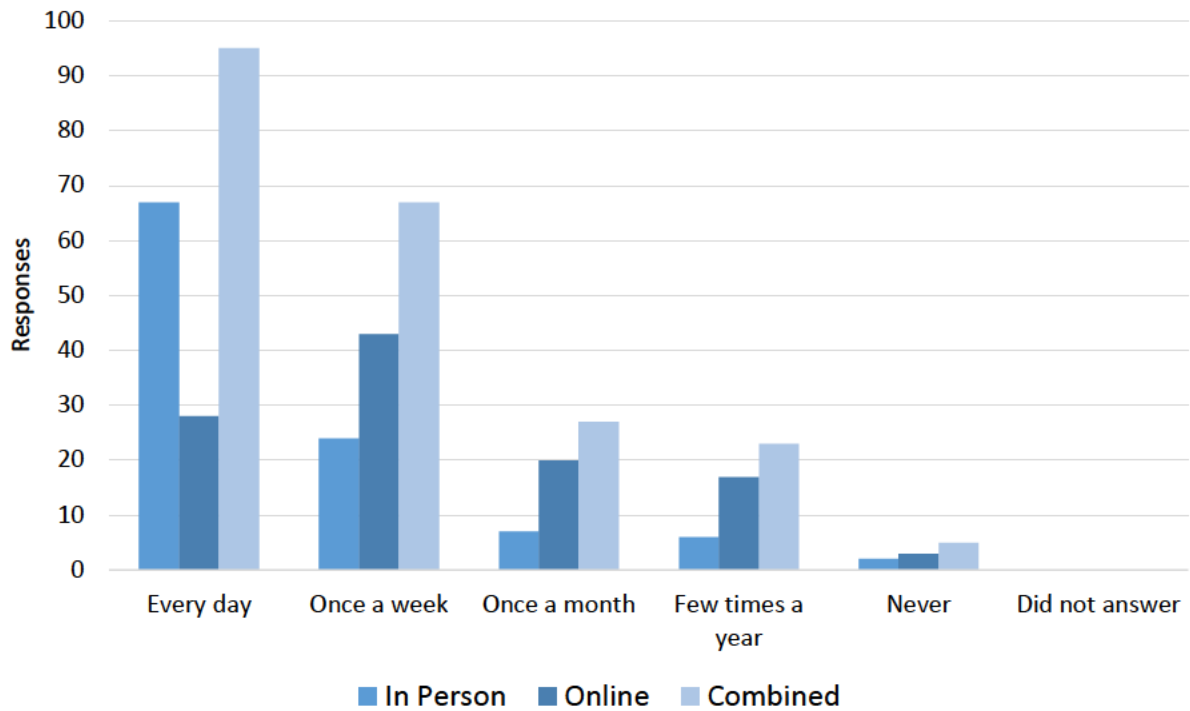

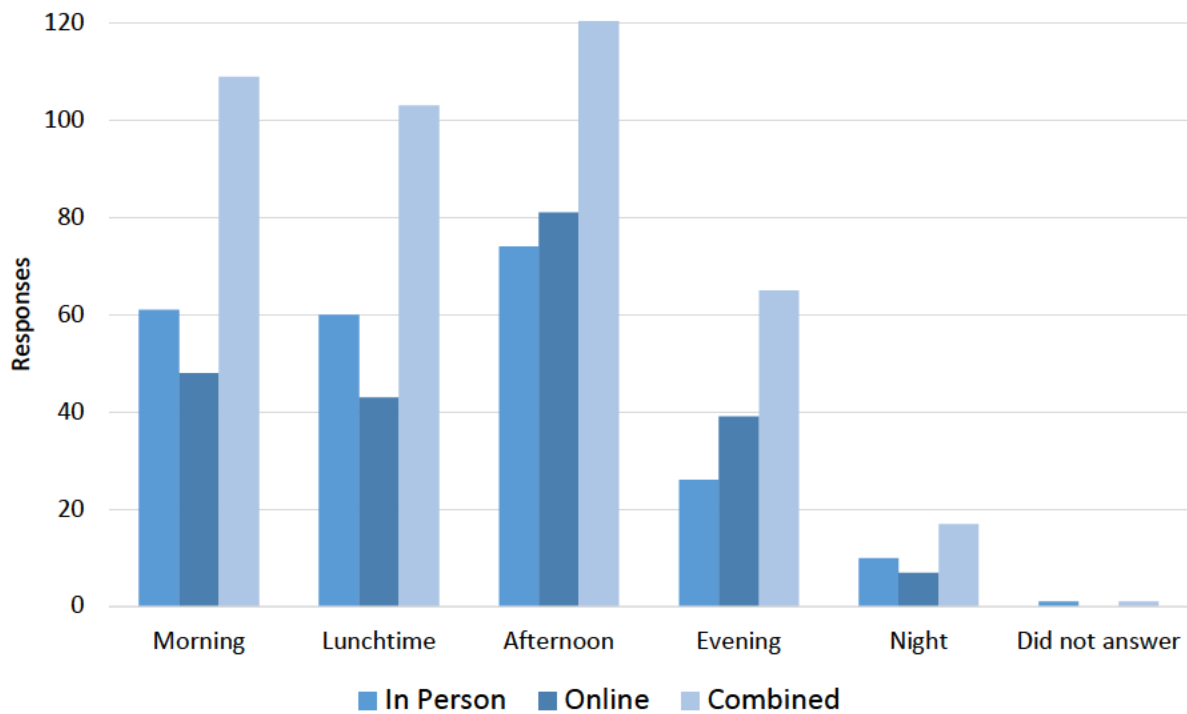

3. How often do you come to Portage Place in **cold weather** seasons?



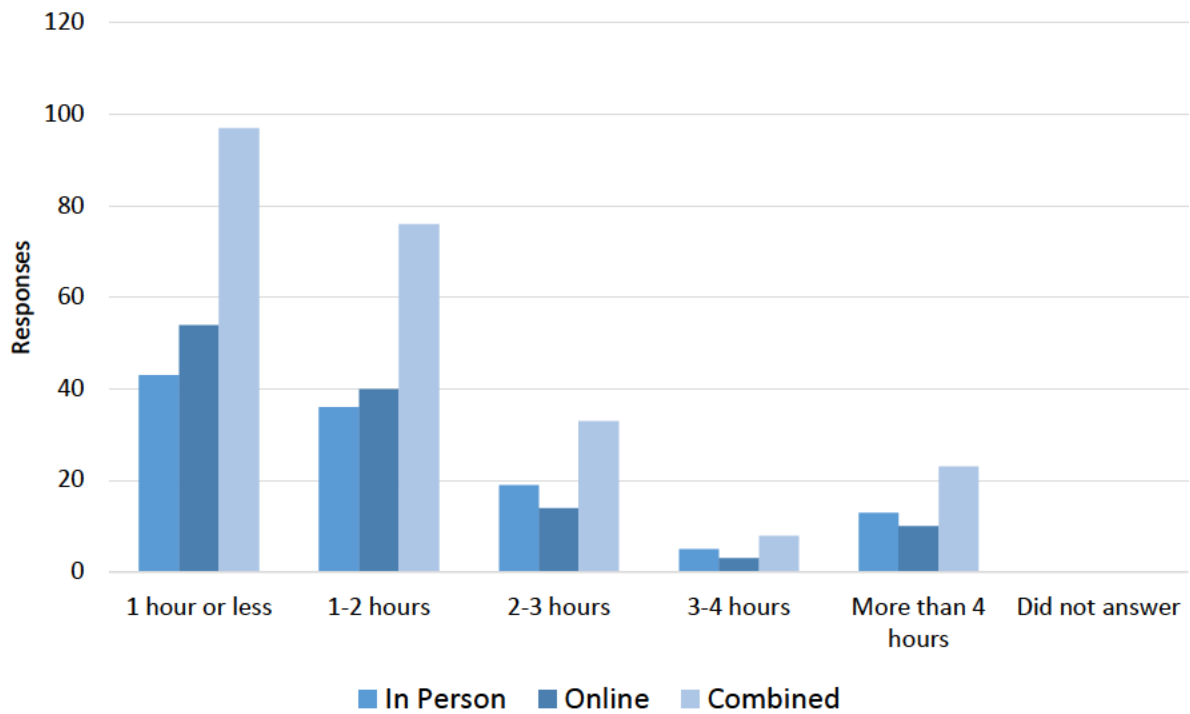

4. What time do you usually come to Portage Place?



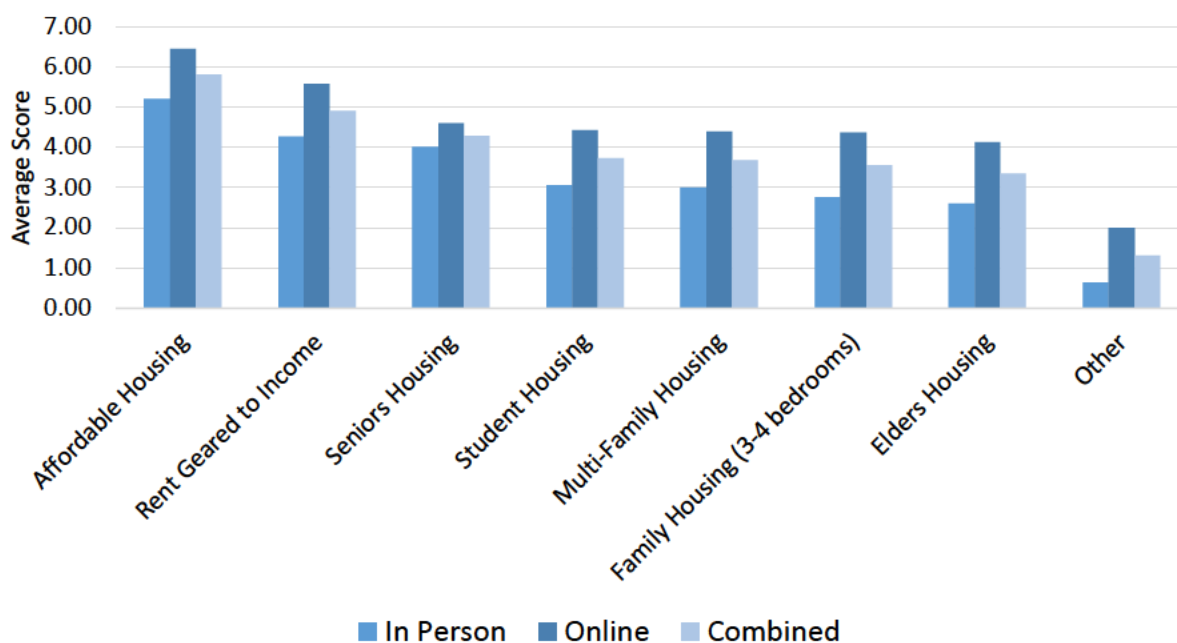

I was hoping for a state of the art safe harm reduction site downtown staffed with experienced counsellors and resource people included. Perhaps medical to serve. Downtown nation wide epidemic of drug addicted people providing a state of the art setting to give hope, guidance, programming toward housing and a productive drug free existence. Your medical facility could incorporate a small such facility with just a few possible also in-house drug rehab units for the minority of users that are ready and wanting to get drug free and into housing with appropriate work training and education. With guidance of professional councillors many of whom have taken this journey. Reduction site with professional and culturally appropriate councillor and staff and security can be housed successfully with other mentioned venues eg. separate exit for safe harm reduction site. Facility can be private and professional. Institutions can and should not longer sit on there hands over this. The loss of life, suffering frankly was of human potential among this with no contentment nor feeling of accomplishment or contribution to society is vast and unfortunately epidemic proportions. It is a new age on which unfortunately includes many people who have turned to street drugs and are addicted (North America wide) We can't as a nation NOT deal with the reality anymore. In addition to number 10. All facets of #10 as usual are great and important. Although I'm not too happy about all of Portage Place Mall being demolished for your new structure (waste of materials) I am happy that your designs include a lot of Green space areas as I am completely Environmentally Concerned. Too much Tree-chopping and lawn-spraying and chemicals goes on in this city as if the Environment were not in crisis with bird and pollinating insects dying off in large numbers I trust you will not be applying/relying on chemical pesticides or herbicide maintenance or at all. Instead using plants/shrubs and trees this natural ground covers. (There are several lawn and garden companies who advertise and sell the natural/non-chemical options for greenspaces and gardens) Also a little research on you part will have to be done (otherwise I will gag constantly all day every day) into servicing NON-GMO (non-genetically-modified) plants shrubs and trees for the gardens and greenspaces because I am low income so often without phone minutes

and I have not be able to search out nurseries that do have certified non-gmo plants shrubs and trees beyond finding some non GMO seed packets at Contain Tire (organic non-gmo pet grass) I think I am also non-gmo organic vegetable seeds) All sorts and Rona. May European and some Lantin American Countries have banned GMO foods and products. There is a lobby in Canada to at least label GMO foods and some states I believe require labelling. There have been several scientific studies showing the GMO foods cause disease and organ failure in people. So why would we pollute and harm our natural informant by providing plants shrubs and trees to birds bees, butterflies, etc. that are undoubtably harmful to them and changed on the genetic level. I have mad just a few inquiries. I don't think many of the local nurseries have twigged to this issue yet. You will have to talk to a faire number of supervisory or managerial people at the nurseries/farms etc. and possibly order from further a field online. We cannot plant and offer that the natural world harmful genetically altered food which also enter the wider countries and wild areas through flight and defecation of seeds, reproduction/offspring. IF this is not also affected inhibited.

There has to be a way for the space for the complex to manage the risk of it being dominated or even overrun by the large numbers of homeless & impoverished people who are so visible (and underserved?) in the area.

The theatre in Portage Place is one of the best Winnipeg has ever had. I hope it can be incorporated in the plan. A movie theatre is a must regardless.

The Skywalk is extremely important to those of us who live attached to it, especially those of us with canes, walkers, wheelchairs, scooters etc. Please try to keep the skywalk open as much as possible during construction. A grocery store especially if it is local such as Food Fare would be great.

The skywalk connecting Portage Place to apartments and Y north of it and neighbourhood areas to the south and east of it is a critical thoroughfare and walking route for those living in the apartments. The skywalk needs to be accessible and safe daily through Portage Place for extended hours (eg. 6 am to midnight).

The medical centre is a good idea. But the main function should be the promotion of a sense of community which values diversity. Greenness is now crucial in all development.

The location should encourage active, healthy pursuits. Central Park is a great example of revitalization that includes soccer pitch, splash park, playground but can become dangerous when open alcohol, drugs and disorderly behaviour is tolerated. 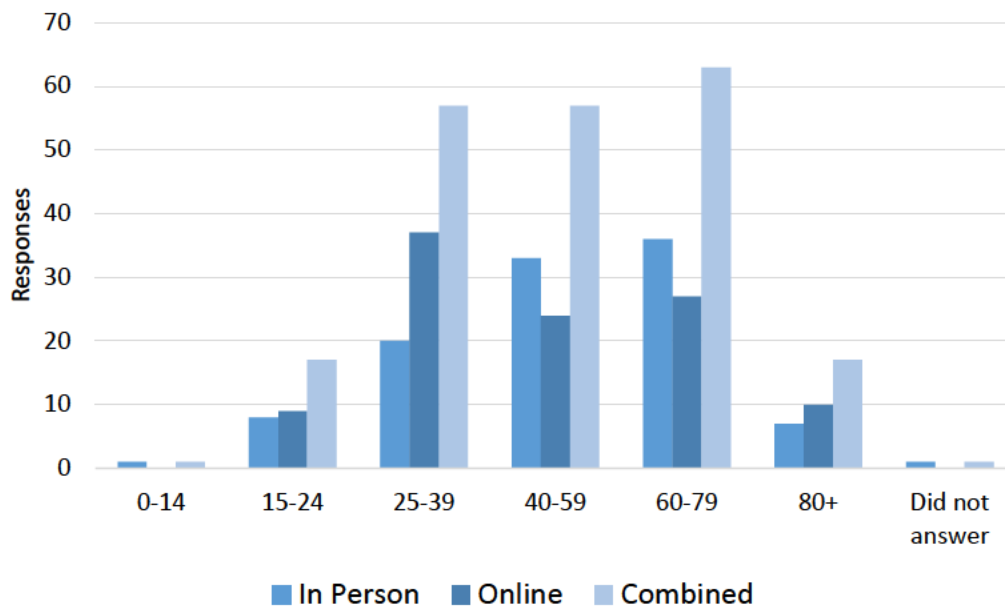
continue to only cater to the upper income brackets, the same problems we have today will continue, and the city will be worse for everyone.

It needs to be a community hub for the people who live downtown who are mainly seniors, university students, immigrants, indigenous people, homeless people and those suffering from mental issues. It needs to be a place that offers the supports and amenities that this population needs. It needs to have lots of green spaces and recreation areas where people of these diverse cultures can meet and get to know each other. If it has this neighbourhood environment people from the suburbs will have far less apprehensions and feel safer about visiting our neighbourhood.

It is important to maintain accessible skywalk for people with mobility issues and seniors. The proposed open air section would not be safe (it would move the Air Canada park issues to inside the Portage Place area. Construction period will greatly impede the issues of seniors wanting to move ro 55+ life leases at Fred Douglas Chateau and Place. Ensuring safety and mental health/addiction services to enhance safety in public spaces will be important. I urge strong advance consultation with WPG police and Downtown Community Safety Services to discuss models in advance and strategies to keep downtown safe. This is an exciting endeavour - I love living downtown but feeling safety at bus shelters and walking (even in daytime hours) is restricting my activity and enjoyment.
Indigenous peoples need a cultural place , a place to just be .
Inclusive indoor skate park Affordable services only
If you want to get Winnipeg residents to visit Portage Place there must be a free parking time of 2 or 3 hours so people do not have to pay for parking. This could be done by giving by issuing a free Parking Pass for persons entering the parking in the area. When I lived in Cranbrook,BC, I was given a free parking pass when I turned 65 so I could park in the metered areas for free. This encouraged me to shop in the downtown area and not worry about getting a parking permit. It is my belief that parking and paying a high price for parking as well as the crime are the reasons residents are weary of visiting downtown Winnipeg.
I would like more fitness programming that meets the needs of people who live downtown. The downtown Y's schedule primarily aims to meet the needs of folks who work downtown.
I would highly encourage a partnership with the YMCA, a wonderful non-profit organization that provides support to the community in many ways - physical, mental, newcomer services, daycare etc. We need a Gym downtown... not a GoodLife or other chain, but a commitment to the community with an already established partner in a historic building
I want it to be a space for everyone. I miss it being public, I miss hanging out and seeing people, I miss it feeling lively.
I truly believe that building an indoor skatepark in the new development would create such a fantastic environment for youth and families to gather and have a safe space for fun. This would bring so many more people through the area and would in turn boost revenue to any surrounding businesses and create the feeling of a community space !
I think the approach of creating spaces and services for the people who are already in the area and visiting Portage Place, rather than trying to attract people outside the downtown, is a good one. I do wonder, given the safety concerns about Air Canada park adjacent to Portage Place, what the safety plans are for the proposed green spaces. It would be wonderful to have more green space in the area but only if most people feel comfortable using it.

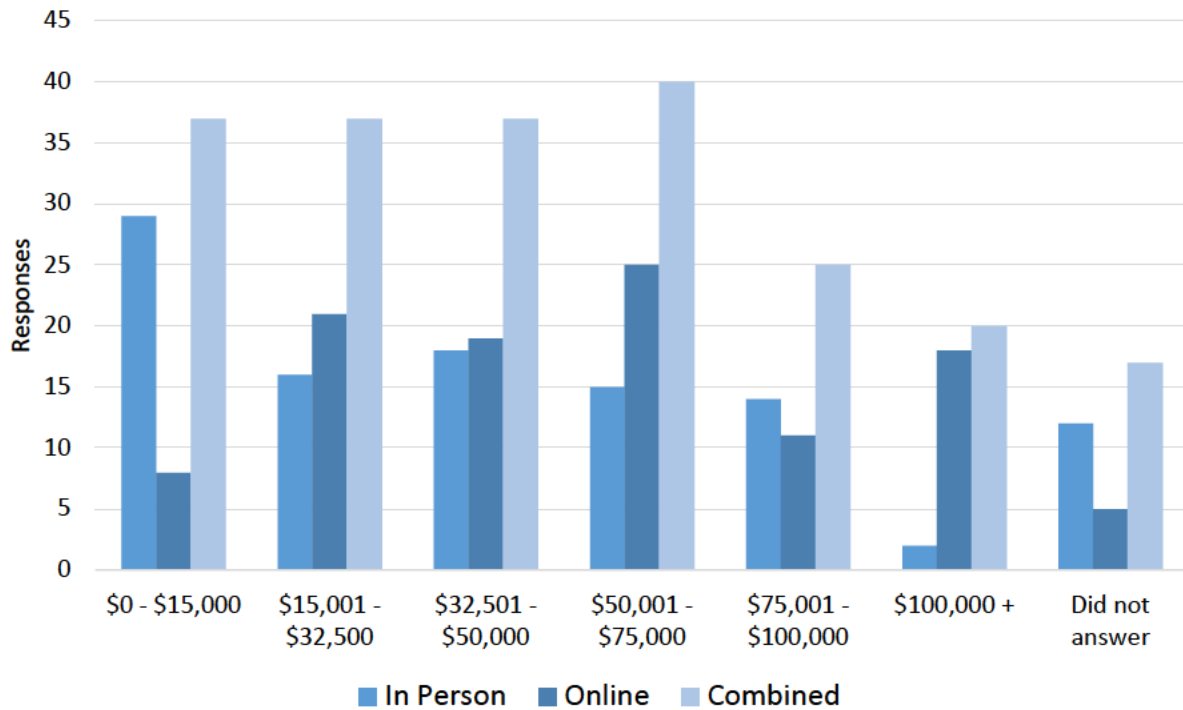

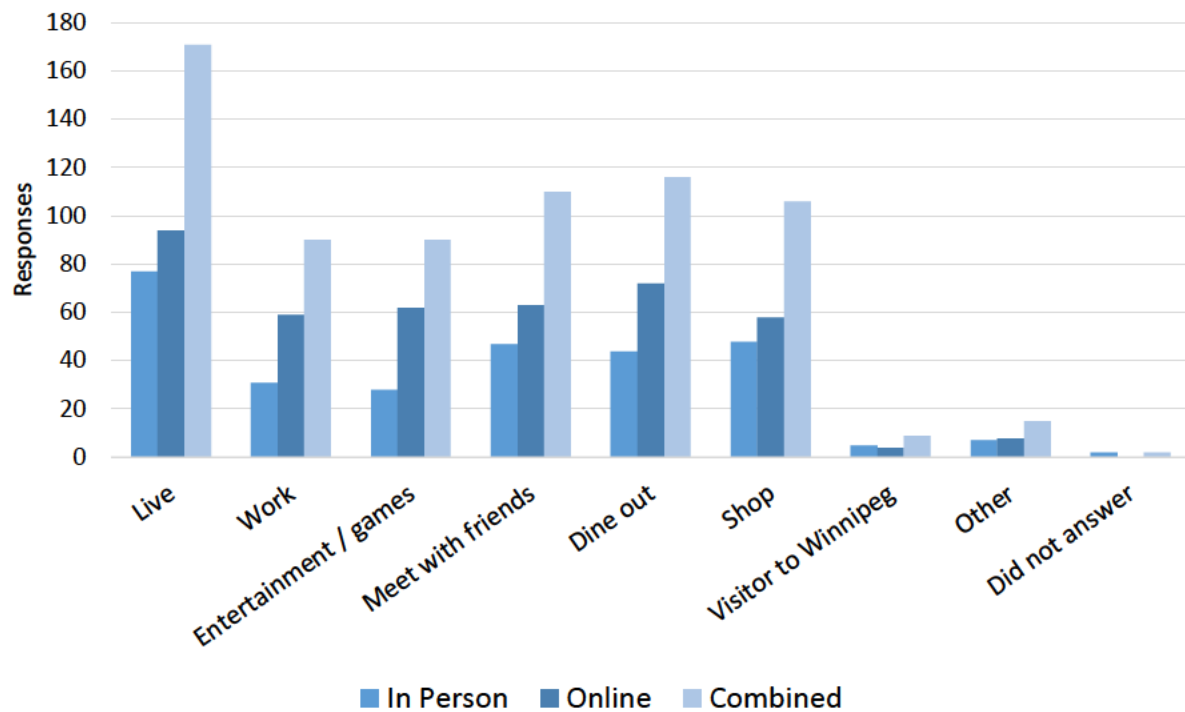

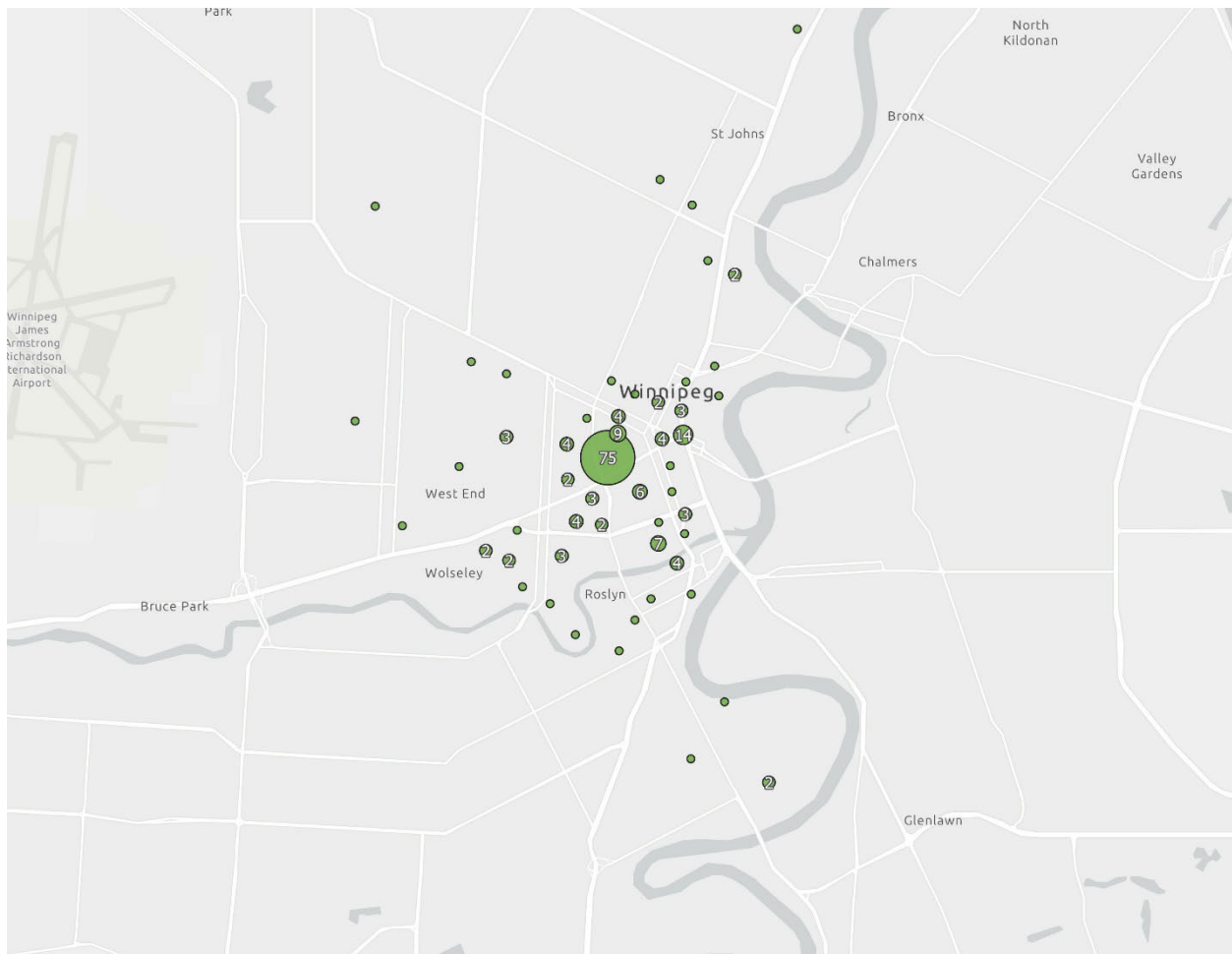

Survey results presented herein use clustered column charts with categories comparing youth, equity-serving organizations, and combined stakeholder responses.

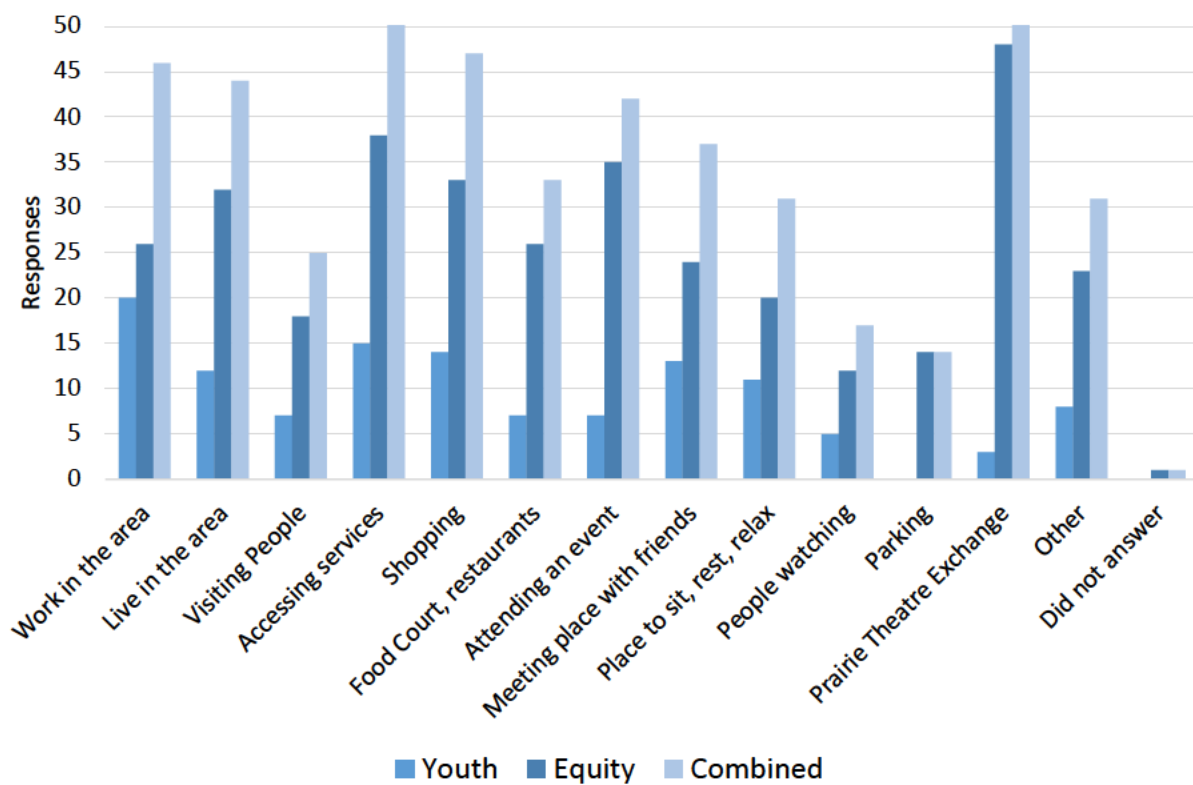
Ranking questions (questions 6-10) are intended to measure priorities for housing, food security, neighbourhood services, arts and culture, and greenspace. They are evaluated based on the average score that each choice was given. Scores are determined based on the number of options provided in the question.

For example, if there are 5 choices in the question, the choice at the top gets a score of 5, the choice after that a 4, etc. If you have a list with 7 choices, the one at the top gets a score of 7, and so forth.

Please note:

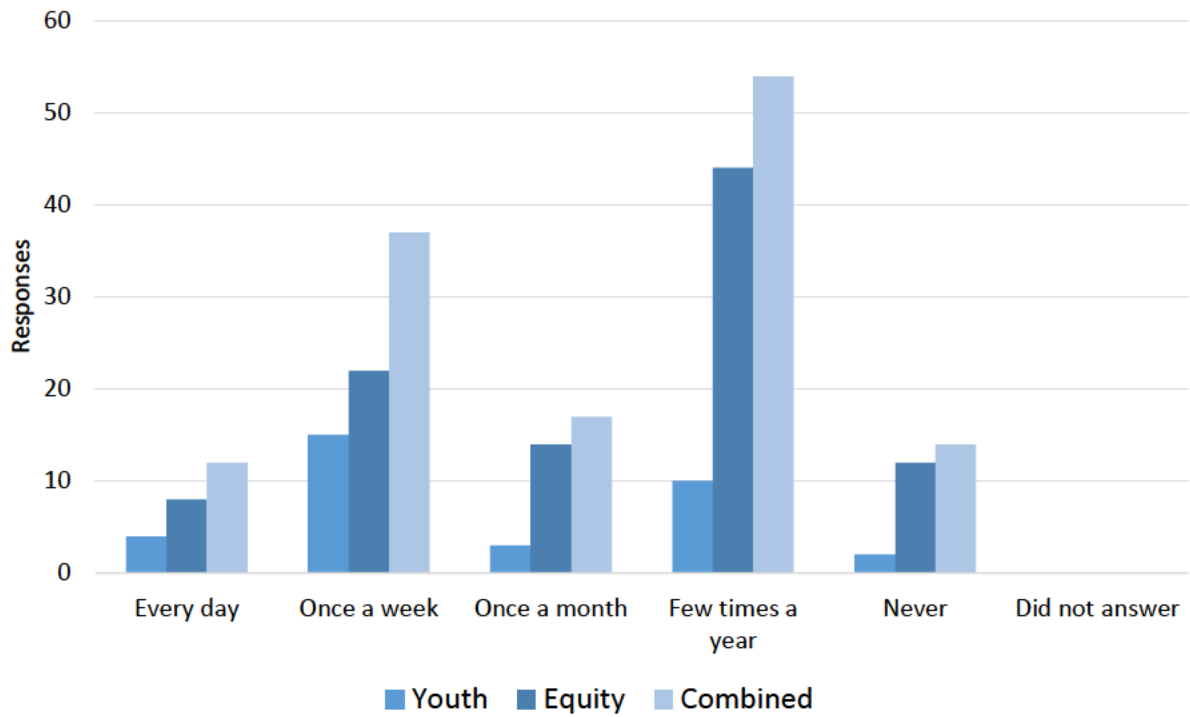
1. Since there were a number of people who skipped the ranking questions for the in person survey, in addition to those who ranked only a few items (as opposed to the online survey that required each choice to be ranked), the average score of the in person survey is significantly lower than the online score due to skipped and incomplete answers being given a default score of 0, therefore lowering the average score.

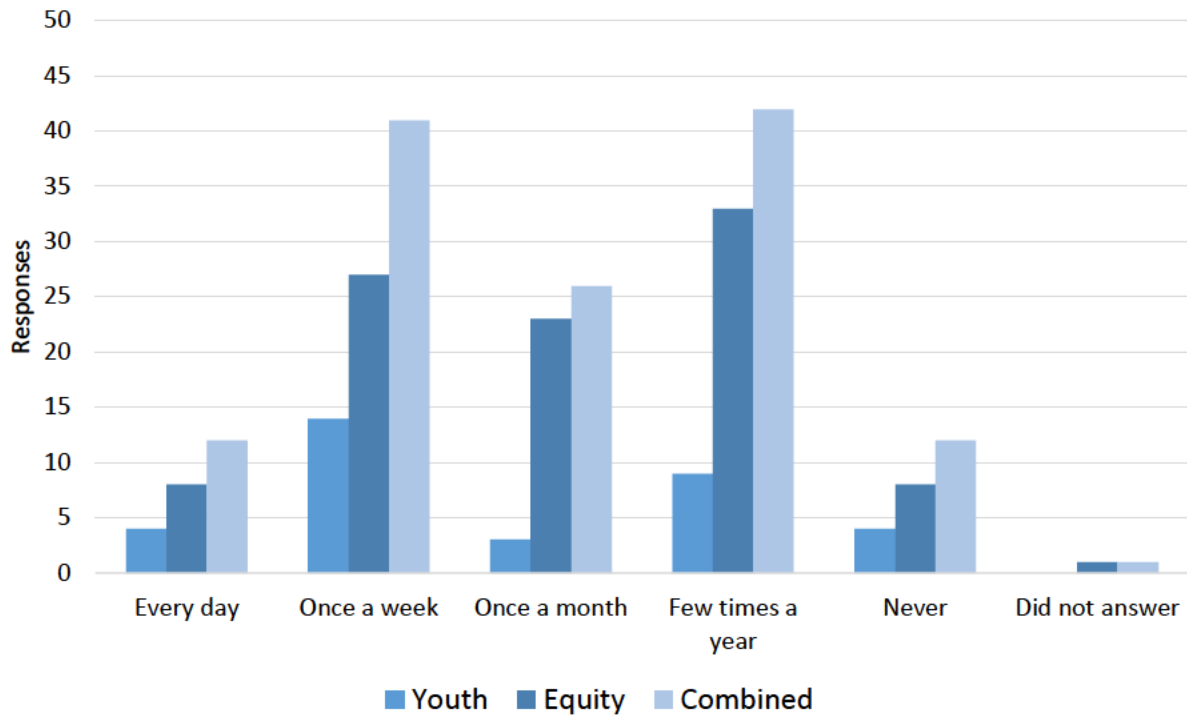

2. How often do you come to Portage Place in **warm weather** seasons?



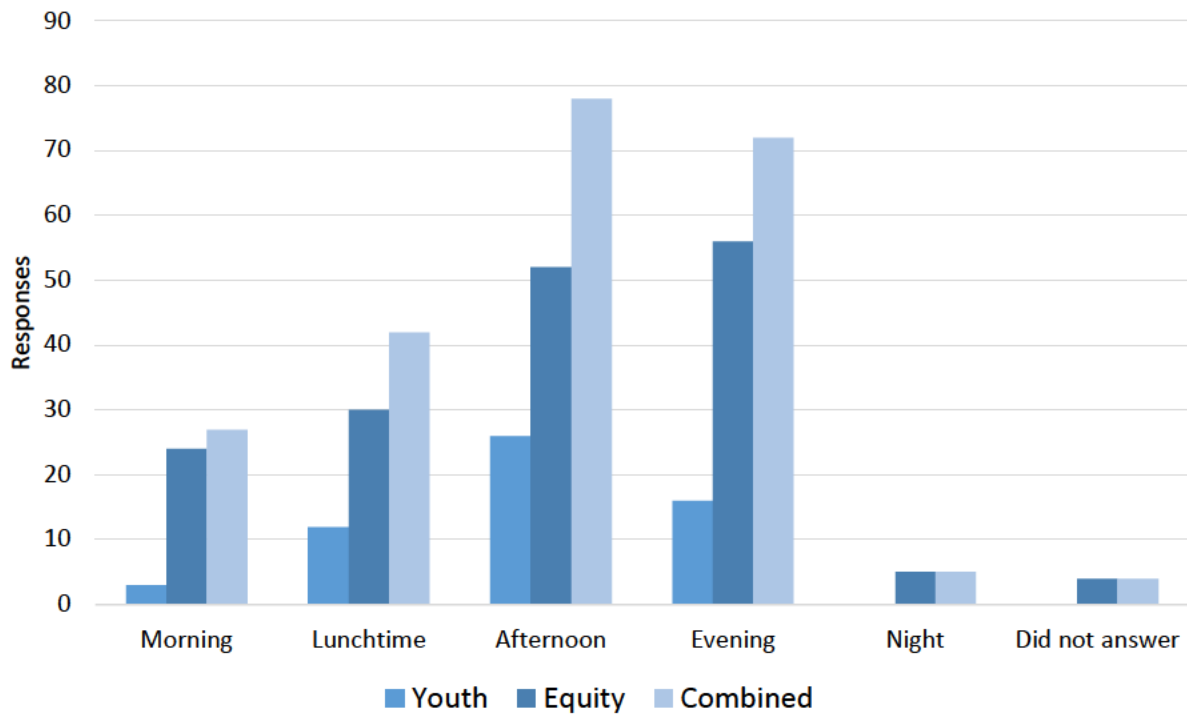

3. How often do you come to Portage Place in **cold weather** seasons?



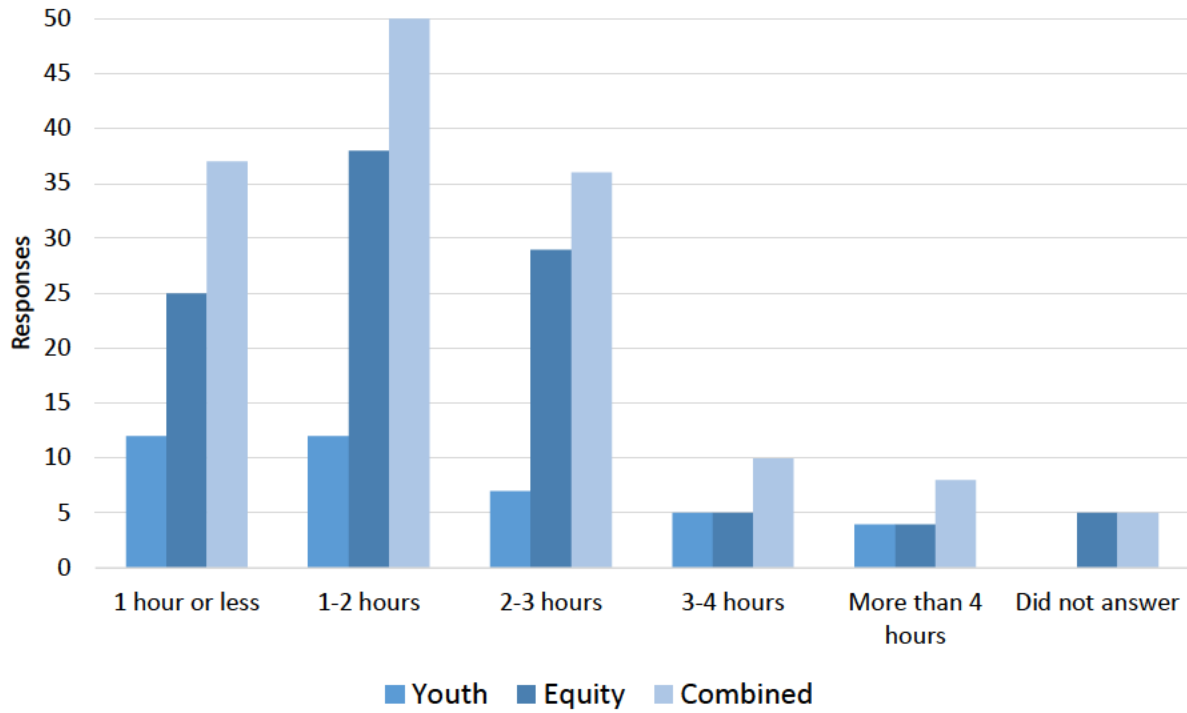

4. What time do you usually come to Portage Place?



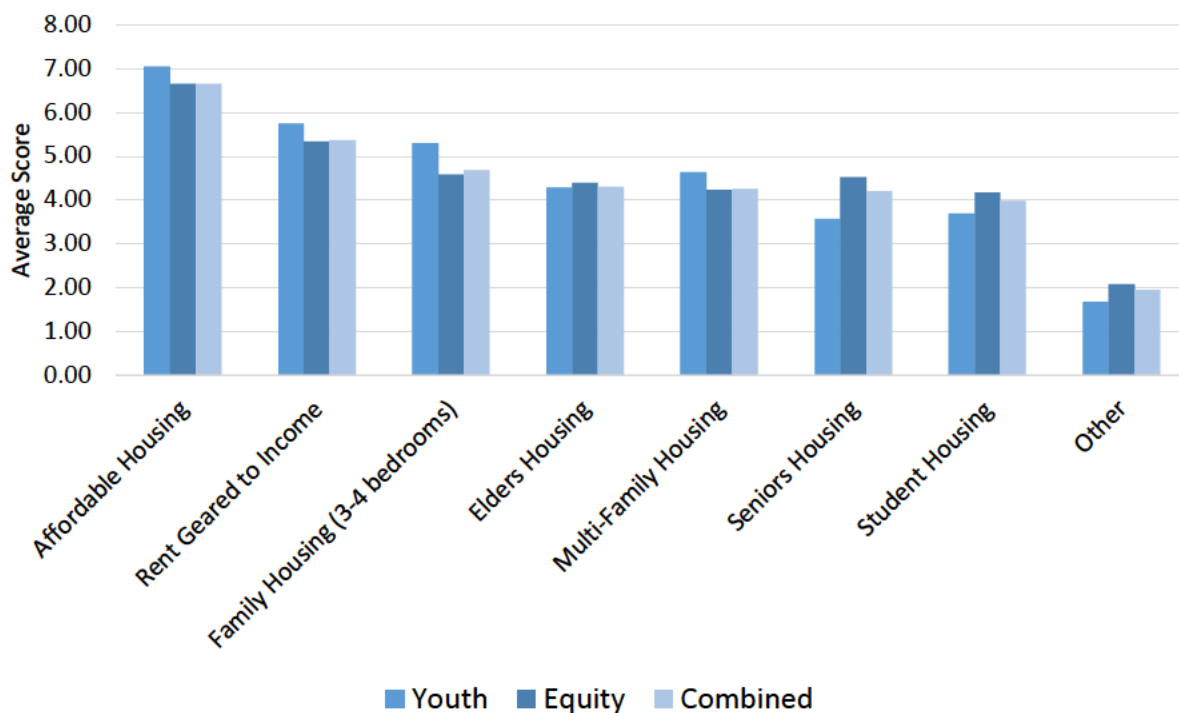

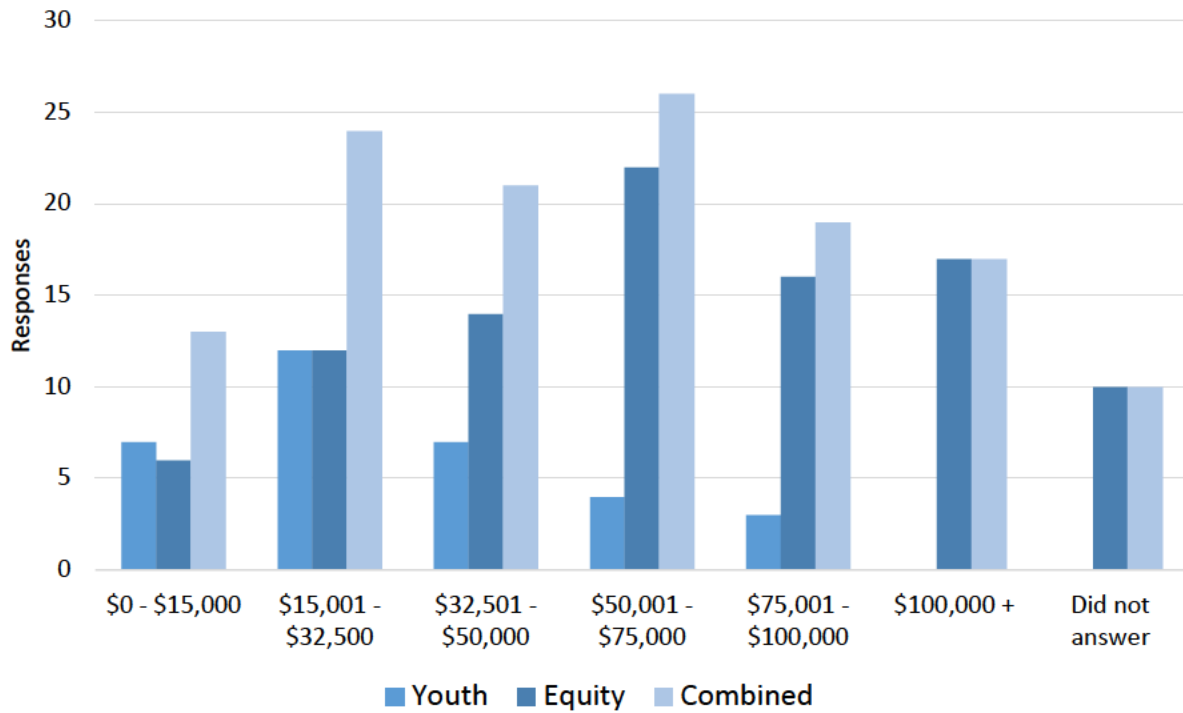

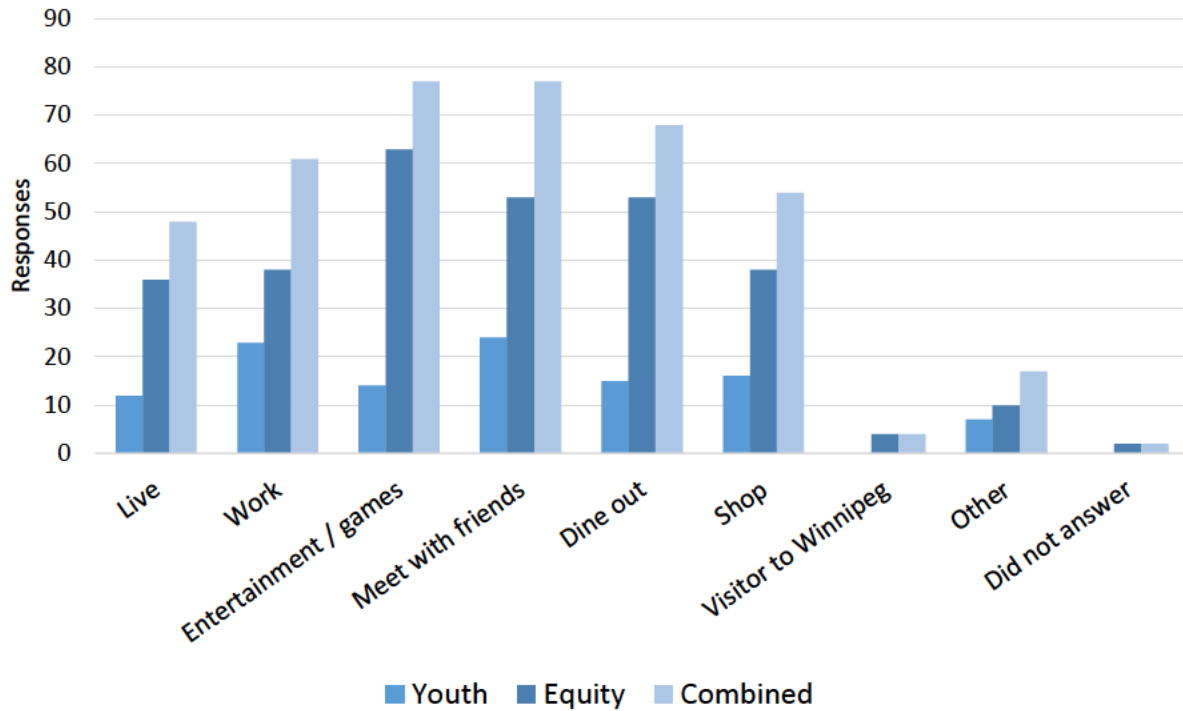

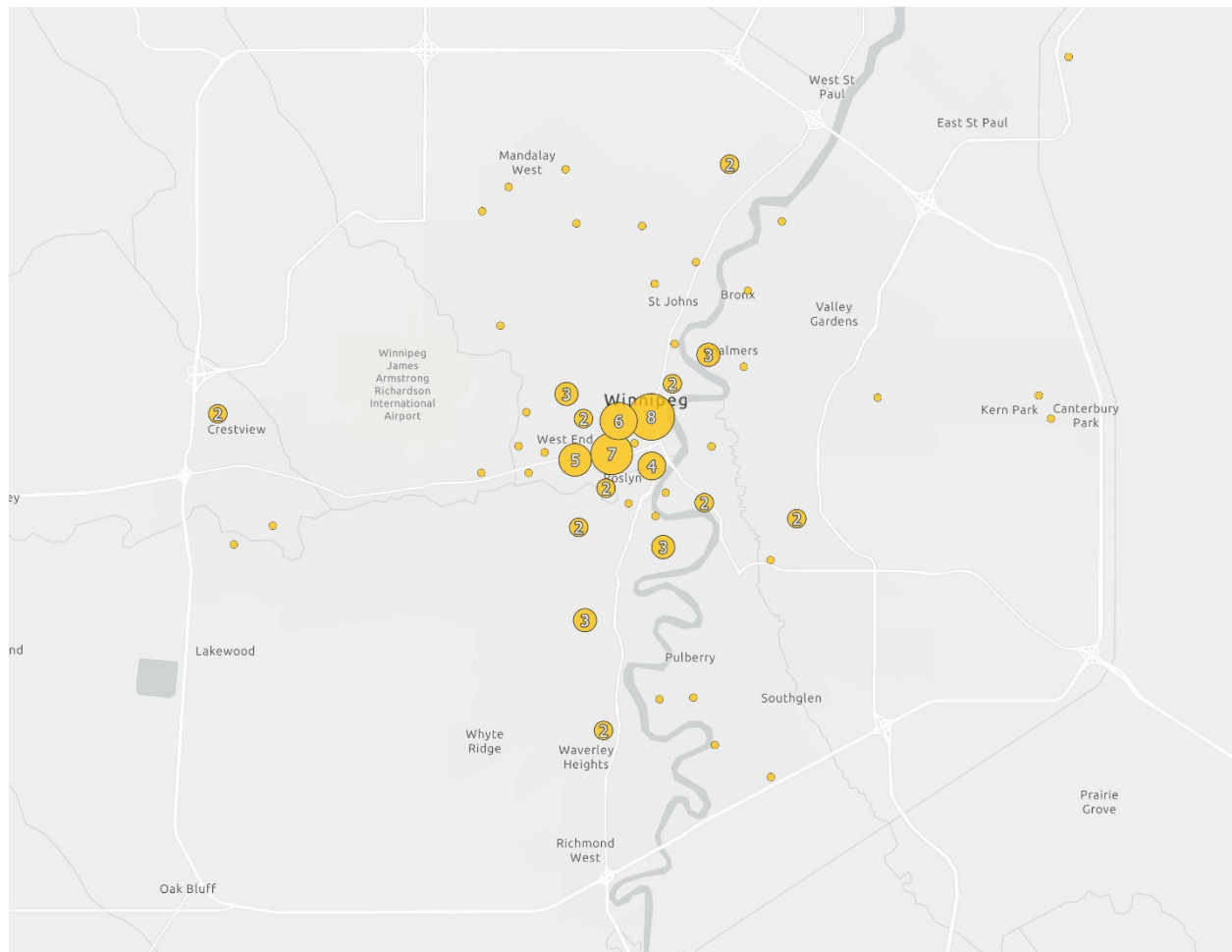

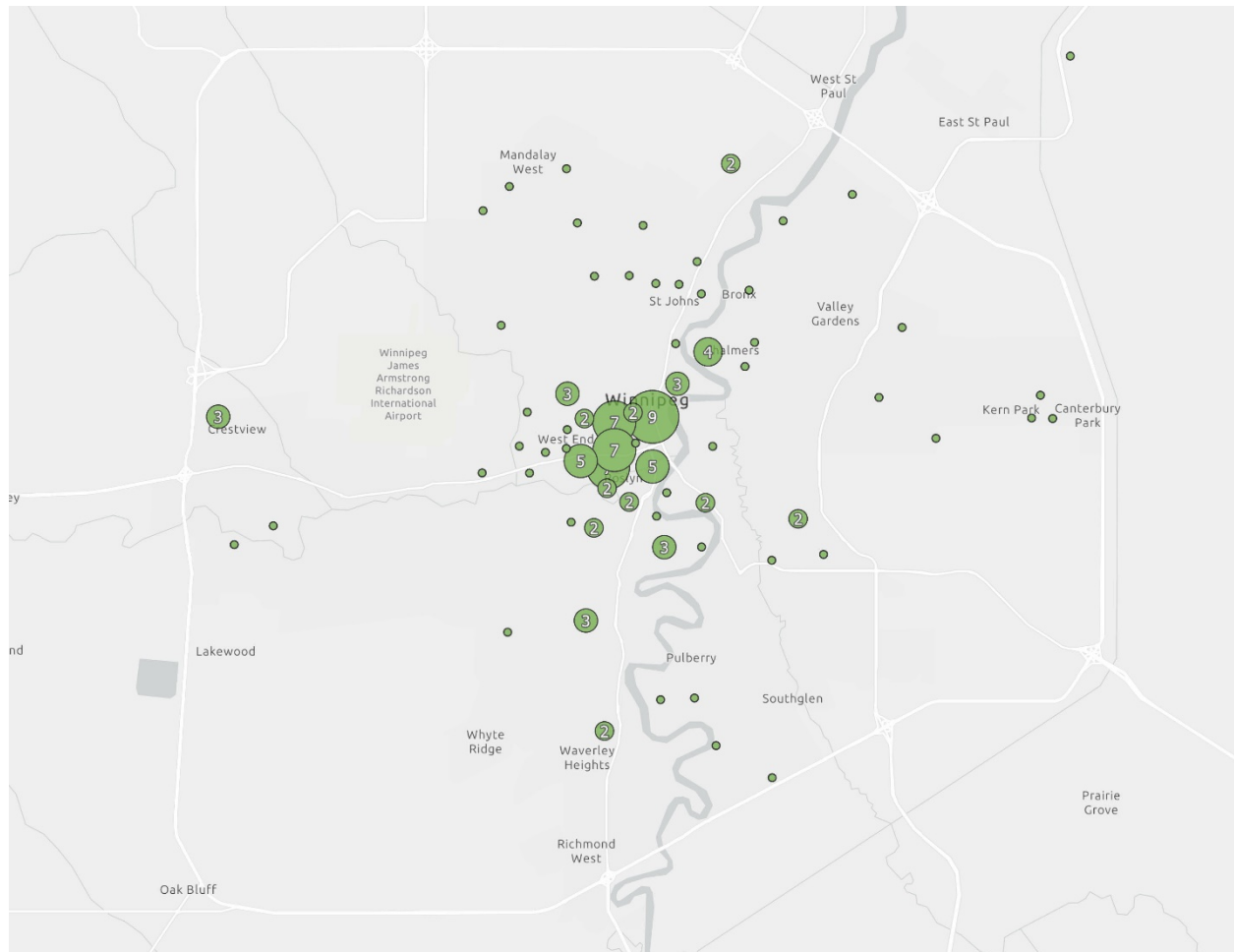
Targeted Interest Group – Youth (Art and Skateboarding organization) Responses

Since everything shut down over COVID it's been a depressed vacant downtown. People don't feel safe. I used to love shopping downtown. Downtown had the high-end shops at one time, Eaton's, The Bay, and even Portage Place in the beginning. I agree if you put in more housing and a grocery store it will come alive again. Make it affordable for people to want to live downtown and be proud of it once again.
- I would love to see Prairie Theatre Exchange with the main floor street access to Portage Avenue. Having a theater on the main floor with street access would add so much street traffic, visibility, and energy to downtown much the way you see in the Exchange with MTC during their season. I don't want PTE to be hidden in the mall.

- Feeling safe is #1. Security has to be visible but not abusive/intrusive.
- Winnipeg is very vicious at times with the homeless community. So things can turn south very fast.
- No matter what plan you come up with, if people do not feel safe, they will not come. Good luck with this.
- I worked downtown when Portage Place was a vibrant mall filled with working people shopping, having lunch, and seeking entertainment after work. The underground concourse at Portage and Main was vibrant as well. Both were killed by vagrants and addicts hanging out, shoplifting, and eventually doing drug deals in the food courts. There was a shooting in the bus shack outside the mall. I was in line for a Timmy's coffee when cops tackled some dealers just ahead of me. Security guards were chastised for asking loiterers to move on, because the loiterers were "community leaders". If you turn Portage Place into a low-income social housing project, you will just create an artistically designed ghetto. It's scary using the parkade for Jets games as it is. People aren't pimps, and addicts and dealers because they don't have options. They are what they are because of the choices they made. Perhaps recent refugees from Ukraine with two jobs can show them how to overcome real adversity.
- I work downtown and often go to Portage Place to shop at different stores. I always have to go with a coworker as I have found it not to be a safe place. We even had scary encounters even with there being security. This is one main reason Portage Place is not succeeding. It needs to be 100% safe.
- Try to keep the drugs out.
- This is the only mall accessible to my workplace, and we frequent this place for lunch walks, meet up with friends outside work, and connecting to other malls. Priority should always be safety so people will go back and trust the downtown area again. And, we look forward to the future development as it will boost Winnipeg's tourism industry and even the economy supporting locals. Thanks.
- Have more security around the door entrance and exit.
- More accessible.
- Well lit, safety, address bus stop harassment.
- Without addressing the disproportionate amount of social housing around central park, this wonderful project is doomed to fail. The entire downtown needs to be a community of mixed income and diverse people.

[REDACTED] needs to be dispersed and not concentrated, so people who are struggling and need help are saturated with the rest of life, everyone helping each other. Mandate social housing in 10% of all new multifamily builds in MB, and we are on the way. Sell all social housing government MF projects to the private sector. Give the subsidies to the people in need, and let them choose where they want to live. Then watch our inner city and downtown take off.

- The concept to revitalize Portage Place is wonderful. However, there will need to be a well-trained police & security team due to the nature of the vision and based on the increasing violence & in Winnipeg, & the drug & alcohol-related incidences. I was a client at True North Dental but have quit going there due to being harassed for money or followed by individuals high on drugs or drunk. Not a pleasant or safe experience.
- The biggest issue right now is making people feel safe. It is intimidating to walk by the big groups of people congregating in the mall and especially the Air Canada Park. I often will not leave my office during the day to even run errands as I am not comfortable carrying a purse or shopping bags in the area. Washrooms that people can easily access would be good as well. I am often accosted by the disgusting smell of urine and excrement in the area as you enter or leave Portage Place. Especially in the alcove to Subway Restaurant and the Carlton side of the mall.
- Street level access along Portage Avenue to facilitate pedestrian traffic.
- Some shiny lights won't deter all the bad criminal activity from behind Portage Place. Opening up a walkway will make people feel even less safe. While we enjoyed the demo last week on the slide show...the number 1 problem is with the riff-raff behind the mall. I hope there are ways to solve it.
- Downtown Winnipeg has become a scary place to be. Addictions services, mental health programs, programs to help people get off the street, should be a number one priority. You will not attract more people downtown with the level of poverty, addictions, and mental health issues that are becoming extremely prominent downtown. We need to help our fellow human beings heal from their traumas. People need to feel safe.
- These are our neighbors in downtown, not 'those people.' They need dignity. I strongly believe in Housing First & then solve the issues. TN needs to coordinate with the Centre 2050 planning. Many of us don't drive. Transit & bikeways are important. Mixed use is so important for this area. I moved back to Winnipeg after being away since 1988. I chose to live in downtown because I wouldn't need a car & due to the diversity of the neighborhood, the closeness of the WAG, the Library, performing arts, the skywalk. I am disappointed in TN Square-- it is too rich for me & I retired as a professor w/a healthy pension."

I have worked downtown for 25 years near Portage Place (I remember \$3.50 parking) and I am a guy, so feel less potentially affected, I don't know any females who would walk near Portage Place alone due to safety and harrassement. If anything is solved, the safety problem must be solved if you want people to show up to the new place. I know, I know it is a tall order, it is a complicated situation but nobody will willfully go (with their kids?) to an unsafe location. The area is full of "people with behaviors you are taught to avoid". What for, there are other "paths of least resistance" to go to around Winnipeg with free parking. I do have high hopes to breath more (safe) life into downtown!

- Key is it has to be a safe place. As a senior, I do not go to Portage Place now. Years ago I did a lot of shopping but would not go now. Do not feel safe.
- Keep riff-raff out, more police presence.
Keep downtown CLEAN. Keep us safe. Need visitors from the Globe. KEEP THE BUS CLEAN AND SAFE.
- It needs to be safe. We cannot fix a problem we are not allowed to talk about; the crowd of people who currently frequent Portage Place are terrifying, and they aren't going anywhere. We need programming, assistance, and safety measures for these individuals. Let's have a place for rehabilitation, therapy, social assistance, etc. Even though a movie theatre is cool, if the crowd of Portage Place mall doesn't change, no one is going to use it.

- It currently doesn't feel safe to walk through any part of downtown until safety is addressed nothing else matters with the plan. As it currently stands, most of my coworkers especially the older women will go to work park in the parkade and refuse to leave our office building due to safety concerns. since covid walking through downtown has been the only time I've ever felt unsafe in the city.
- Increased security including more cameras are needed both inside and outside the facilities. Far too many vagrants hanging around asking for money and harassing people who want to mind their own business. It makes us feel unsafe coming downtown.
- It needs to attract everyone, from all income levels and backgrounds, to the downtown core. Winnipeggers need to feel safe, and excited about visiting, while at the same time interested in living in the area. Otherwise, we're not moving forward.
- I would suggest earmarking a large portion of whatever investment is being considered for security and safety in the area. If people don't feel safe, they won't come, and this initiative will be a non-starter. Safety - and the perception of safety - are critical.

- I have lived downtown for over 40 years, Portage Place used to be on my regular route. But I've rarely been into the building for the past few years, used to go to Staples, but

now only stop into Shopper's if it's easier than going to the one at River and Osborne. I think it's most important to have a clean environment – when the Community Connections went into the Library, it created a huge garbage problem. I don't know who should have been in charge of that, but inside and out it was totally neglected. I like the idea of a community center plan, and thought the library space would be a big benefit. But it became a gathering of homeless, very vulnerable people, lots of erratic and dangerous acting out. Very sorry that plan was a fail. I don't see a lot that I would use, but am totally in favor of the central development plan – hopefully it will help the situation that's downtown these days.

- I have lived and worked downtown for over ten years and LOVE downtown. I hope to see this space redesigned to be an inclusive, safe, and inviting space for all Winnipeggers to be proud of. I miss when I could take care of most of my shopping downtown without having to travel to another community and hope that retail and groceries will be considered in this design.
- I grew up as a kid coming to that mall to show and to see movies. Now it's not safe to even bring my own kids too. Something has to be done about the safety in the area and with whatever it ends up turning into. No one wants to go downtown anymore due to the safety issues.
- I believe Portage Place development should be seeking in-depth community consultations from the individuals who currently use Portage Place the most to ensure they still have input and a place they are welcome and safe.
- I am excited about the opening up of the barriers, but physical and social. I want to know how this redevelopment project will keep the people who live in this community in the forefront.
- I am a resident in a seniors' building north of Portage Place, and I use the skywalk system to get to my building to a variety of places downtown such as the library, the bank, and the Canada Life Centre. In my view – the skywalk system must be preserved.
- How to balance the safety concerns with patrons and businesses and entertainment and the community that lives in and around the space.

It takes half or one hour. They need a skywalk system because winters here are long and cold, and if they had to go outside, they would fall and break something. So having a skywalk system all the way keeps our hospitals with fewer visits. We desperately need a grocery store, please keep Shoppers Drug Mart, and we also need enhanced security.

- This should be a 24-hour safe space for the community.
- Keep/add to skywalk links.

- Windows on the main floor that you can look into, that don't have the blinds drawn down. Give people on the sidewalk something to look at and help them feel safer by blending the indoors with the outdoors.

- It needs to be a community space, open 24/7 to everybody. Retail isn't working there, so let's do something different. This is never going to be a money-making opportunity.
- It needs to be a community hub for the people who live downtown who are mainly seniors, university students, immigrants, indigenous people, homeless people and those suffering from mental issues. It needs to be a place that offers the supports and amenities that this population needs. It needs to have lots of green spaces and recreation areas where people of these diverse cultures can meet and get to know each other. If it has this neighborhood environment, people from the suburbs will have far less apprehensions and feel safer about visiting our neighborhood.
- Be a place that can be a positive and fulfilling place for the community prioritizing the residents while also welcoming the working and visiting community.
- I would like to see designated spaces for youth, that are low-barrier and accessible. These currently exist in the form of Studio 393 and Pitikwé. Similarly, Art Beat provides an accessible space and free programming for community members, although not youth-specific. As plans are being generated for a new True North Campus, I would like to see spaces such as this continue to be included, and in a more intentional way. I would also like to see recognition that Portage Place currently functions as an important meeting space for many people living in Winnipeg's central park neighborhood. In a manner of speaking, it is already a community center. In order for new plans to be successful and properly meet the needs of the community, the voices of those currently using the space should be heard and considered in greater detail.
- It is important to maintain accessible skywalk for people with mobility issues and seniors. The proposed open air section would not be safe (it would move the Air

Canada park issues to inside the Portage Place area. Construction period will greatly impede the issues of seniors wanting to move to 55+ life leases at Fred Douglas Chateau and Place. Ensuring safety and mental health/addiction services to enhance safety in public spaces will be important. I urge strong advance consultation with WPG police and Downtown Community Safety Services to discuss models in advance and strategies to keep downtown safe. This is an exciting endeavor - I love living downtown but feeling safety at bus shelters and walking (even in daytime hours) is restricting my activity and enjoyment.

This would bring so many more people through the area and would in turn boost revenue to any surrounding businesses and create the feeling of a community space!
- Prairie Theatre Exchange attracts clients to the building in the evening, as does the YMCA. Patrons of these places to eat and drink and need other cultural experiences to make a hub. Separate this purpose out from the services (such as grocery and government) and housing aims and areas that are meant to also make downtown more livable, but in a different way. Services close in the evenings, and all of the spaces around Prairie Theatre Exchange and the Y need to be open and vibrant in the evening for this sector to gain momentum and take off. A movie theatre is a great idea. Restaurants could then thrive.
- People living, working, and having main services make for a vibrant downtown.
- Please consider allowing the skatepark to flourish and you will see how big of a positive impact it will have on the community and the all-around feeling of downtown.

- I would like to see more traditional training areas, i.e., Powwow, public teepees.
- Please include the community and the people living and working in the area. Involve the arts and culture.
- As a social service provider (newcomers) I think you must make sure the plan integrates Indigenous needs, perspectives. Also, I don't think making it purely social purpose is good (have seen downtown malls not succeed when they become solely social purpose). I think a mix is good. Must be inclusive of low-income people and meet their needs (e.g., RGI housing, grocery, services) but a great deal of thought has to be made regarding folks who are unhoused/deep in addictions/erratic and in a bad place. They deserve dignity and respect, but they also can't easily be co-located with the other priorities. You don't want to be known as 'kicking out the homeless' so a lot of thought needs to figure out how to provide some level of support (e.g. housing first, addictions/detox, food bank), but not compromising the safety and community feel that is needed to make this successful. If you work closely w the Southern Chiefs, perhaps they can inform and guide.

- Think about Indigenous peoples when planning and implementing.
- There is a need for healthy community recreation that is safe, accessible, enjoyable, and excellent! If you are interested in developing this sort of programming in the arts, please consider partnering with a non-profit organization called Genesis Arts Community. The group of spirited females behind this operation has a heart for the city and as a team, represent a history of over 20 years of providing accessible arts education and training in our city.
- This is an opportunity to build community, build a neighborhood that is truly inclusive - for too long those on the margins, many of whom have called downtown home for a long time, have been left out, pushed out, treated with disdain, racism, fear, and discriminated against. If you build/design a community that meets the needs of those that have the least power, who are on the margins, then it will be a neighborhood that will likely meet the needs of all people without excluding anyone. Finally, given that we are on Treaty no 1 Territory, there should be space for Ceremony, and some of the services/service providers should include Indigenous Agencies.
- Student housing is of critical importance; involve our youth as a stakeholder in the 'neighborhood' and the investment is made to Downtown.
- Should prioritize community centers (like Studio 393) in your future plans. The studio is a place where the downtown community can learn tangible life skills. The studio cannot be replaced with anything else - it is one of a kind and has had a lasting impact on its surrounding community.
- redevelopment should include indigenous community input
- Putting indigenous communities and ethnocultural communities at the forefront of these plans is imperative
- Prioritize the health and wellbeing of Indigenous and racialized peoples first and foremost. Have the Bear Clan in there not just downtown community safety partnership. A lot of these folks are traumatized by excessive enforcement and need mental health care and addictions care, not to be policed. An emphasis on recreation for kids will help too! 24/7 drop in for kids would be fantastic.
A community space designed to support those who live downtown and have less access to cars. A place accessible to all different types of mobility. A community first project to support the downtown population first!
- 1. Support for those who are most vulnerable. Who frequent Portage Place presently. 2. New Canadians have already started up small shops in Portage Place and the promenade walkway. I would hate to see them priced out of business because of the increase in rent. 3. For those who are struggling with addictions and homelessness, housing has to have on-site support services. 4. Incentives for job training programs/businesses for a variety of groups: youth, newcomers and those who are seeking to reintegrate back into society. 5. My last plea is for trees and more trees around Portage Place with treed areas in strategic places. Landscaping and flower baskets everywhere! And Portage Place as a central hub for public transportation. The water public art at Millennium Park is beautiful. Think water, food, art, and lighting for all seasons at Portage Place. Joe's Bison at Hydro Place can be matched with equally beautiful art across the street at entrances at Portage Place.
- I hope you're collaborating with people connected with the Hudson Bay project to avoid duplications of services.
- Have people who represent the community that is already in the area take part in the development of the vision.
- Community involvement as to what is most needed is crucial in this redevelopment.

Instead using plants/shrubs and trees this natural ground covers. (There are several lawn and garden companies who advertise and sell the natural/non-chemical options for greenspaces and gardens) Also, a little research on your part will have to be done (otherwise I will gag constantly all day every day) into servicing NON-GMO (non-genetically-modified) plants shrubs and trees for the gardens and greenspaces because I am low income so often without phone minutes, and I have not been able to search out nurseries that do have certified non-GMO plants shrubs and trees beyond finding some non-GMO seed packets at Contain Tire (organic non-GMO pet grass) I think I am also non-GMO organic vegetable seeds) All sorts and Rona. INTRODUCTION

The summary provided below outlines the key points from the working group meetings held between May 17th and July 5th. To ensure respondent anonymity and confidentiality, the notes have been edited, safeguarding individuals' privacy throughout this report. Furthermore, specific topic notes have also been adjusted for respondent anonymity while preserving transparency and respect while retaining the theme or intent of the comment.

The summary primarily focuses on the overall themes and general comments expressed by the working group throughout the public engagement process. Although numerous back-and-forth dialogues occurred during the meetings between the Public Engagement Team and the participants, these conversations have been limited in the summary to prioritize the comments and themes resonating from the working group's important input.

OVERVIEW OF COMMENTS MADE THROUGH WORKING GROUP AND FOCUS GROUP MEETINGS

The subsequent summary encapsulates key themes and topics discussed in the Working Group meetings, thoughtfully organized into relevant themes/categories for enhanced clarity and effective communication.

Engagement Process:

There was a strong emphasis on active and proactive public outreach, including involving local social, safety, and community organizations in the process. Participants expressed concerns about the established nature of the proposed design and felt frustrated that their input was sought after significant progress had been made. They emphasized the need for more concise communication about the purpose of public engagement and pre-established aspects of the design. Concerns were raised about past public engagement sessions at Portage Place conducted by other companies, and stakeholders expressed a desire for True North to exhibit a more robust commitment to listening and incorporating feedback. Survey results were analyzed, showing consistent rankings and comments from downtown residents. The Public Engagement Team presented the proposed methodology for redacting derogatory comments, and stakeholders agreed to proceed with redactions while providing an explanatory statement for transparency.

Healthcare Services:

Participants stressed the significance of mental health and counselling services in the proposed development. They also emphasized the need for accessible public washrooms and nearby safety services. There were suggestions to include various types of medical care in the new healthcare facilities to make them more inclusive and accommodating. Participants expressed concern about witnessing individuals experiencing mental health challenges on the streets without adequate assistance, and they hoped the new development would prioritize accessible support services.

Accessibility and Safety:

Safety and security were discussed, with an emphasis on the necessity of ethical and effective safety services and features in the development to ensure a safe environment.

Residential Component of Design:

Affordable housing was consistently brought up as a critical consideration by several participants throughout the meeting. They emphasized the importance of addressing affordable housing in the proposed development and requested dedicated assurances from the development team regarding this aspect.

Community, Social, and Cultural:

Participants highlighted the reputation of Portage Place among new Canadians as a place for information and community connections. They urged the new development to preserve an inclusive culture that fosters inter-community connections and avoids creating divisions among different social groups. The importance of economic services to support local entrepreneurs and grow new businesses was emphasized. Participants also suggested opportunities to honour significant local community members as part of the development. The incorporation of an extensive indigenous perspective in the design process was continually discussed, considering the significant urban indigenous population in Downtown Winnipeg and the developer's collaboration with the Hudson Bay project. Participants urged for the new Portage Place development to help retain some of the existing Arts, Community, Social, and Cultural tenants in the building.

Comments on the Proposed Survey:

Participants made suggestions to enhance survey accessibility, such as including pictures for users with lower communication abilities. They also provided feedback on the survey, identifying areas for improvement in terms of clarity and communication of survey choices. There were requests to emphasize topics related to Culture and Arts and community amenities more prominently in the survey.

MEETING 1 - SUMMARY – MAY 17,2023

Engagement Process:

- Concerns were raised about the extent of the proposed design's establishment or finalization.
- Participants were frustrated and felt as though the design was significantly advanced before their input was sought, leading to feelings of being unheard and an inefficient use of time.
- Stakeholders were informed about the Public Engagement Team's unawareness of the pre-established concept design prior to public release, and how the Health Centre component being relatively more solidified due to the need for consultations with all levels of government.
- Suggestion to involve other community groups, such as local social, safety, and community organizations to assist with the survey. Persons Community Solutions (PSC) hosts were recommended.
- Following the reiteration of the established Health Centre component, there was an emphasis on more concise communication about the purpose of public engagement, its impact on the proposed development, and the pre-established aspects of the design.
- Strong emphasis on active and proactive public outreach, including visits to community groups and obtaining better public feedback.
- Concerns were raised about the previous Portage Place public engagement session conducted by other companies, with participants expressing frustration that their input had been neglected by developers. There is a strong desire for True North to exhibit a more robust commitment to actively listening and incorporating feedback compared to previous engagements at Portage Place.
- Importance of incorporating Indigenous design elements in the building structure/environment for inclusivity and a sense of place for the existing Indigenous community.

Healthcare Services:

- Participants stressed the significance of mental health and counselling services, acknowledging their inclusion in the proposed design.
- Emphasis on the need for public washrooms and nearby safety services.
- Suggestion to include various types of medical care in the new healthcare facilities to make it more inclusive and accessible.
- Concern was expressed about witnessing individuals experiencing mental health challenges outside without adequate assistance, hoping the new development will prioritize accessible support services.

Accessibility and Safety:

- Safety and security were discussed, with an emphasis on the necessity of ethical and effective safety services and features.

Residential Component of Design:

- Housing, particularly the provision of affordable housing, was consistently brought up by several participants. Participants emphasized the importance of the development team addressing affordable housing in the proposed development. They expressed that, with such a commitment, they would request dedicated assurances from the development team.
- Inquiries were made regarding the management of the building tenants in the residential component of the proposed development.

Community, Social, and Cultural:

- Participants highlighted Portage Place's reputation among new Canadians as a hub for information and community connections. They urge the new development to preserve an inclusive culture that cultivates inter-community connections and mitigates potential divisions among different social groups.
- Participants emphasized the importance of economic services to support local entrepreneurs and to grow new businesses.
- Participants suggest opportunities for the new development to honour significant local community members.

Comments on the Proposed Survey:

- Suggestions to enhance survey accessibility by including pictures for users with lower communication abilities.
- Feedback provided on the survey, identifying an opportunity to improve the clarity and communication of the survey choices.
- Participants' request to emphasize the topics of Culture and Arts and community amenities more within the survey.

MEETING 2 - SUMMARY – JUNE 22, 2023

Engagement Process:

- The project team shared how the in-person public engagement was successful in reaching lower-income demographic groups and engaging with the local downtown community.
- Concerns were raised again about the extent of the proposed design's establishment or finalization. Participants were still frustrated and felt as though the design was significantly advanced before their input was sought, leading to feelings of being unheard and an inefficient use of time.

Comments on the Survey:

- Permission from the stakeholder group was given regarding removing derogatory terms or references from survey responses. Transparency was also emphasized.
- Participants proposed reviewing and comparing survey responses from individuals outside the downtown community vs those who identify within, it was highlighted that it's important to include and consider all opinions.
- The project team offered to extend the survey deadline to gather more targeted input from certain demographic groups, participants proposed targeted outreach sessions during the first phase of engagement to gather additional feedback.

Community, Social, and Cultural:

- There were discussions about providing greater clarity regarding the programming and uses of the proposed community centre amenity space.
- Feedback was provided regarding the Arts and Culture section of the survey, suggesting the inclusion of more options for existing tenants and community organizations.

MEETING 3 - SUMMARY – JULY 5, 2023

Comments on the Survey:

- Survey results were analyzed, showing consistent rankings and comments from downtown residents. Three maps showcasing survey sample locations in Downtown Winnipeg were shared and well-received.
- The Public Engagement Team presented the proposed methodology for redacting derogatory comments, and stakeholders agreed to proceed with redactions while providing an explanatory statement for transparency.
- Uncomfortable comments from the survey were discussed, acknowledging an opportunity to further improve widespread education on acceptable language.

Engagement Process:

- The Working Group and the Public Engagement team collaborated in organizing Strategic Focus Group meetings to reach harder-to-reach demographics.
- Continuing to build relationships emerged as crucial, with stakeholders advocating for continued Public Engagement discussions.
- Upcoming timelines of the Public Engagement were again presented to stakeholders.
- Participants proposed for the development team to collaborate with other downtown businesses to ensure the proposed services and amenities do not overlap with other developments in the downtown area.
- The project team's utilization of the Persons Community Solutions hosts for the pop-up event was praised by stakeholders.
- Some participants requested more time to complete surveys.

Accessibility and Safety:

- The importance of accessibility, both in universal design and physical access, was discussed for any future Portage Place development.

Community, Social, and Cultural:

- Incorporating a more extensive indigenous perspective in the design process was again discussed, given the significant urban indigenous population in Downtown Winnipeg and True North's collaboration with the Hudson Bay project. The need for accurate indigenous data and perspectives was emphasized.

INTRODUCTION

The summary provided below outlines the key points from the working group meetings held between July 13 – July 19. To ensure respondent anonymity and confidentiality, the notes have been edited, safeguarding individuals' privacy throughout this report. Furthermore, specific topic notes have also been adjusted for respondent anonymity while preserving transparency and respect while retaining the theme or intent of the comment.

The summary primarily focuses on the overall themes and general comments expressed by the Focus Groups throughout the public engagement process. Although numerous back-and-forth dialogues occurred during the meetings between the Public Engagement Team and the participants, these conversations have been limited in the summary to prioritize the comments and themes resonating from the working group's important input.

OVERVIEW OF COMMENTS MADE THROUGH WORKING GROUP AND FOCUS GROUP MEETINGS

The subsequent summary encapsulates key themes and topics discussed in the Focus Group meetings, thoughtfully organized into relevant themes/categories for enhanced clarity and effective communication.

Engagement Process:

Participants in all three meetings expressed enthusiasm for the proposed plans and emphasized the need to reach out to additional community groups. They highlighted the value of relationships, discussions, and solutions developed during the public engagement process, urging for continued collaboration beyond its conclusion.

Healthcare Services:

Mental health and counselling services were stressed as significant aspects of the proposed design. Participants requested the inclusion of various medical care options to ensure accessibility. Some participants also emphasized the importance of public consultation with downtown community health centers and the Manitoba Association of Community Health Centres as valuable resources.

Accessibility and Safety:

Safety and security were thoroughly discussed in all meetings, with an emphasis on ethical and effective safety measures. Participants emphasized the need for inclusivity in the new development and requested clarity on the physical accessibility of the design, including transit, specialty services, and parking. Incorporating Universal Design elements in the residential tower was suggested.

Residential Component of Design:

Affordable housing provision was a consistent topic across all meetings. Participants stressed the importance of addressing affordable housing and requested dedicated assurances from the development team. Inquiries were made about the management of building tenants and expressed a desire for family housing options.

The need for affordable commercial spaces and stores catering to the local community was discussed, as well as the importance of retaining existing tenants. Participants also emphasized the significance of economic services to support local entrepreneurs and new businesses. Enhancing social connectivity through community programming and social spaces was agreed upon as crucial for the neighbourhood.
